He tries new ideas and experiments that involve heavy cost, and gives the benefit of his experience freely to others who could not afford to undertake the hazard. He puts in practice all the new discoveries of science that are applicable to agriculture, mining, metal-working, and forest husbandry, and the results are carefully observed and recorded for the benefit of the public.

To use a German phrase, a "breath of understanding" pervades the whole Schwarzenberg pavilion. Everything is admirably arranged and classified, with a view to affording accurate and valuable information, as well as to making an attractive show. At the entrance you see first the spoils and implements of fishing and the chase. All kinds of food-fishes found upon the Prince's estates are to be seen preserved in alcohol, and on the wall above, nets, rods, and fishing tackle are prettily grouped. Just in face of the entrance is a bit of mountain side with real trees, plants, and rocks, and stuffed animals and birds. A deer bounds thro' a thicket, a sly hare peeps from his covert, a fox scampers over the rocks, a badger peeps out of his hole, and in the trees and among the bushes are game birds of various species. Turning to the right from this picture of wild nature, the visitor enters the wing of the building devoted to the products of woods and mines, while in the wing to the left is the agricultural exhibition. The great merit of the latter lies in the amount of valuable information it affords to those who wish to study it with some thoroughness. In making the circuit of this wing one comes first upon samples of wool in the fleece and also arranged so as to show the length and fineness of the staple. The weight of every fleece is given, and the farm on which it was grown, and near by there are photographs of the animals from which the wool was shorn, and a book giving their genealogy for five or six generations. Photographs of fine cattle are also to be seen, with full records of their honorable ancestors. Then comes silk in cocoons and skeins, with another morocco-bound book of statistics for reference. Beyond is the tobacco department, and further on are hops of various kinds in big bags and little bags. On the walls are stalks of grain, and plants prettily arranged. At the end of the wing there are plates, photographs, and maps of the Prince's numerous esta

mining, and improvements he has undertaken. Colored photograi h of rare plants and great herbariums comes next, followed by oil cakes and glass jars of oil, beet and cane sugar, and sirup, a pyramid of beer kegs, tubs of grain of all sorts (samples that would delight the eye of a Canadian farmer), with facts about their yield; glass jars of fiour and of meal—not only of maize, barley, and buckwheat, but many kinds unknown in America,—like meal of acorns, chestnuts, peas, vetches—all used for food for either man or beast, or both. A pyramid made of blocks of pressed hay, capped by sheaves of grass, is worth notice. Every block is labeled with the name of the grass and the yield per acre. Passing along a little further, rows of glass jars, containing black, brown and greenish substances, stimulate the curiosity. These prove to be fertilizers of all sorts—animal, vegetable, mineral and composite. A

vegetable, mineral and composite. A table of nuts, dried fruit, and wines appropriately comes last.

middels of timber rafts, fences, woodmen's cottages, and all sorts of wooden-ware. There is even a pile of boards and timber, which has passed through the Schwarzenberg mills. Passing these we come to an exhibition of marbles and other building stones from the Prince's quarries, iron from his furnaces and forges, tools from his work shops, and coal from his mines. There is no end to his riches. Here is a box of beautiful garnets, there a pile of charcoal, and beyond a display in blocks, bars and ingots of that rare mineral graphite, and a case of Faber's lead pencils, for which all the material comes from the Prince's domains. I have mentioned only the objects which caught my eye in a fifteen minutes' stroll through the Schwarzenberg pavilion. It is so admirably arranged, so complete and well-ordered, and so full of information about the advanced scientific agriculture of

the advanced scientific agriculture of Eastern Europe, and it contrasts so pleasantly with the aggravating confusion still reigning in almost every other part of the Exhibition, that one with time to spare might well spend half a day in it.
