## LABOUR CONDITIONS

CHURCHILL, MAN.—ACTION TO ASSIST DISPLACED WORKERS

Mr. Robert Simpson (Churchill): I have a question for the President of the Treasury Board, Mr. Speaker. In view of the decisions of this government and of the United States government to reduce sharply the work being carried on at the National Research Council range at Churchill, Manitoba, and in view of the statements by local spokesmen concerning the drastic effect this action will have on the economy and the entire future of Churchill, what action is the government planning to assist those displaced as a result of this decision?

Hon. C. M. Drury (President of the Treasury Board): Mr. Speaker, it is a matter of great regret that the NASA authorities, National Aeronautical Space Administration of the United States, have not found themselves, for budgetary reasons, able to continue the rocket research at Churchill. The National Research Council, however, will continue on its own, and on a reduced scale, the rocket investigation which has been conducted. With a view to causing as little local dislocation as possible, a study is now under way by the personnel of the National Research Council and the Department of Public Works to see how this can best be arranged.

Mr. Simpson: I have a supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. Can the President of the Treasury Board say if any consideration is being given by this government to asking the NASA authorities for further consultation before a final decision is made?

Mr. Drury: Mr. Speaker, the news to which the hon. gentleman referred emanated from an almost five-day discussion with NASA at which an endeavour was made to get them to continue.
