TOM MURRAY MET
END AT WOODSTOCK

FATALITY AT MOTOR CYCLE RACES AT WOODSTOCK.

Woodstock, Oct. 13.—Tommy Murray, a Toronto rider in the motor cycle meet held yesterday, was almost instantly killed in a smash-up before he could start the five-mile sidecar race. His young wife, a Montreal girl whom he married six months ago, was at the track and saw the fatality. She is reported to be in a serious condition from shock. For some reason the judges decided to flag the contestants at the end of the first half mile of the race. As the racers came roaring down the

stretch at a speed of nearly 70 miles an hour, the judges flagged them and the car ahead of Murray slowed down. Murray had his head down and had not seen the action of the judges or noticed the man ahead had slowed up. He crashed into the car in front. CAR OVERTURNS.

His motor cycle was overturned and Murray was flung high in the air, landing on the track on the back of his head. He was at once picked up, but his neck was broken and the jugular vein severed. He died in five minutes later on the track.

Murray was a native of Grand Falls, N. B., and a former member of the Royal Air Force. He had been working at Kipp's garage, Yonge Street Toronto. The remains will be sent to Montreal or Grand Falls.
