The ninth annual session of the Annapolis  
Valley Small Fruit Growers' Association  
was held in Vanbushick's Hall,  
Kingston, commencing at 2 P. M. on March  
9th, in accordance with previous notice.  
A. C. Vanbushick, Esq., in the chair.  
Owing to unfavorable weather and bad  
roads the attendance was small.

After preliminaries such as reading of  
minutes, names election of officers for the  
year. The result was as follows: A. C.  
Vanbushick, president; Dr. Bell, vice-  
president; John Killam, secy.-treas.;  
James Galt, and J. H. Hall, auditors;  
George McInroy, Dr. Bell and Alonzo  
Baker, counsel.

The next item was correspondence  
received since the last meeting relative to  
transportation and marketing facilities,  
which are in the main satisfactory, excepting  
the matter of returning the samples,  
on which subject the secretary was author-  
ized by vote of the meeting to correspond  
with, and if necessary, personally inter-  
view the manager of the W. & A. Rail-  
way.

Business matters next followed in order.  
The secretary was ordered to have 200  
copies of the amended Constitution, By-  
laws and Rules of Order printed.

In the course of a discussion on the  
commission business methods, the follow-  
ing resolution was moved by James Galt,  
seconded by Dr. Bell and unanimously  
passed: "That at our semi-annual meet-  
ing in May or June the association discuss  
the advisability of putting a man in  
Halifax to handle their produce."

After disposing of this very important  
question for the time being, there was  
some talk respecting the multifarious  
uses of heavy packages, varieties of straw-  
berries, fertilization, after which the small  
but very interesting meeting adjourned.
