Nearly two inches of the heads should be out of the water—the steam sufficing to cook them, as they form the tenderest part of the plant; while the hard stalky part is rendered soft and succulent by the longer boiling which this plan permits.

Instead of the orthodox twenty minutes allotted to asparagus, lying horisontally, which half cooks the stalk and overorand consistence, a period of thirty or forty munutes, on the plan recommended, will render fully a third more of the stalk delicious, while the head will be properly cooked by the steam alone.
