ing the Fund, commonly called the Sinking Fund (after paying, or reserving sufficient to pay, all such Sums of Money as have been directed by any former Act or Acts of Parliament to be paid out of the same) there shall and may be issued and applied a Sum, not exceeding Three hundred thousand pounds, for and towards the Supply granted to His Majesty for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and fifty seven; and the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, or any Three or more of them now being, or the High Treasurer, or any Three or more of the Commissioners of the Treasury for the time being, are hereby authorized and impowered to issue and apply the same accordingly.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That the Sum of fifty thousand four hundred ninety one pounds, seventeen shillings and eight pence halfpenny, remaining in the Receipt of the Exchequer, disposeable by Parliament for the publick Service, of the Income of the Surplusses, Excesses, Overplus Monies, and other Revenues composing the said Fund, commonly called the Sinking Fund, for the Quarter ended the Fifth Day of April, One thousand seven hundred and fifty seven, shall and may be, in like Manner, issued and applied at the said Receipt for and towards the said Supply.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That by or out of such Monies as shall thereafter, from time to time, be and remain in the Receipt of the Exchequer, of the Surplusses, Excesses, Overplus Monies, and other Revenues, composing the said Fund, commonly called the Sinking Fund, after paying, or reserving sufficient to pay, all such Sums of Money as have been directed by any former Act or Acts of Parliament to be paid out of the same, there shall and may, in like Manner, be issued and applied a further Sum, not exceeding Eight hundred forty nine thousand five hundred eight pounds, two shillings, and three pence halfpenny, for and towards the said Supply.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That the Sum of Sixteen thousand one hundred and ninety pounds, five shillings, and three pence, remaining in the Receipt of the Exchequer, on the Tenth Day of October, One thousand seven hundred and fifty six, of the Surplus of the Duties on Licences for retailing Spirituous Liquors; and also the Sum of One hundred forty thousand five hundred sixty eight pounds, five shillings, and two pence halfpenny, remaining in the Receipt of the Exchequer, being the Overplus of the Grants for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred
