Continued from Page 1 was thrown from the vehicle and landed on the easthound Harry Andersen, who was behind the car which collided with the Toyota, said he saw the two vehicles smash and then split apart, allowing his wife to drive between them. He said the accident happened in an instant. His wife managed to avoid the man lying on the

highway, he said.

Ann McLean, driving the the westbound lanes just behind the Toyota, said a blue Datsun pulled from the Renforth Drive entrance onto the highway and the Toyota, which was beside it. suddenly pulled sharply into the median. She said the Datsun came close to the centre lane but didn't enter lane and didn't cut off the Toyota car, she said.

"The passenger in the Toyota might have thought ramp was going to hit their car," she speculated.

Like other witnesses behind the Toyota, she said the car went into the median at a sharp angle without its brake lights ever coming on.

Thomas Mahony, administrator of transportation

Transportation said there were six fatal accidents in 1973 between Hwy, 427 and Hwy. 10 on the 401 with seven

persons dying as a result. Pointing out that 85 to 90 per cent of accidents are eaused by driver error, Mahony said that people often drive too fast for weather conditions which "gets them in trouble." He also said tailgating was a major cause of accidents. He agreed with coroner Dr. Kevin Flynn that this area was a "particularly dangerous stretch of high-

way."
