Now, ladies and gentlemen, I have taken up, I am afraid, very much time this afternoon, but I cannot conclude without again expressing to all present here my deep appreciation of the privilege which has been mine to-day, of seeing this beautiful Island of Cape Breton, which is a miniature Canada, with its great resources developed, and its steel industry, symbolical of the great industries of our country. The view of the sea, with its resources, and the forests and the mines nearby, ~~xxx~~ ^{is,} as I say, a picture of the Dominion of Canada in miniature. Having had the honour and privilege of being on this beautiful day with the Prime Minister of Great Britain, ~~xxx~~ I said to him: "Tell me if you ever saw anything like that in your life."

I tell you, when Mr. Baldwin left our shores this morning the tears were in his eyes. He was feeling, and feeling deeply, what this great Dominion signifies to those who are fortunate enough to have their homes here. Many and many a time, as we travelled together, he has said to me: "I wish, I wish, I wish, that I had your opportunities." A new country, new homes, new opportunities, all just in the making---just in the creation. And there he is struggling with problems that have their roots away down one hundred, two hundred, and some of them a thousand years in the past; wrestling with problems that it is almost impossible to cope

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
