The illustration was particularly sad and cast an atmosphere of sepuichral gloom over the almost empty court room. Mrs. Scott had been tried for child desertion and found not guilty. She still sat in the box awaiting trial on the charge of perjury. The girl, for she is little more, appeared anxious but composed. She is of prepossessing appearance and, had she the opportunities of some girls, might have been an ornament in the home. The evidence showed that her mother was dead and Bertha, having no home for herself and baby, had been taken in by two women of the demi-monde caste. They were her only friends. Yet even they did not lesert her in her time of trouble, but were present in court and had even secured the services of Ward Stan-worth for the defense. Mrs. Scott whatever her faults, and even these may be laid to her bringing up, is fine looking girl and her appearance in court could not but excite sym-pathy, and led the Crown Attorney to an effort to save her from the make an effort to save her from the life of shame to which her teachings her life, her lonliness and her absolute want had directed her.
