ROBLIN NOT SENSATIONAL

But Delivers Clesely Reasoned Speech on Political Issues at Baldur.

Winniper, April 15.—Those who expected that Premier Roblin would take advantage at the Conservative nomination at Baldur for a sensational statement were disappointed for the Premier had nothing to say segarding the abrogation of concessions granted the minority in 1897.

McIntyre was unanimously chosen to contest the seat for the Legislature vacated by the resignation of expremier Greenway last November to enter the Dominion House. McIntyre unsuccessfully opposed Greenway in 1963 general election. McIntyre is an original Scotch crofter.

Premier Roblin was received with loud cheering. In the course of a lengthy and closely reasoned speech on the political situation, with special reference to the boundaries dispute and to the contest in Mountain, he said that this was a critical period for Manitoba. this was a critical period for Manitoba. The crisis had been precipitated by the creation of the two new Provinces to the west, but it had been bound to come some day. He referred briefly to the school question, pointing out that there was no reason in the world why it should have been mixed up with the just demands of Manitoba for the extension of the boundaries.

But it was part and parcel of the policy that Manitoba had had meted out to her by the present authorities at Ottawa for years past.

An Explicit Denial.

Referring to the insinuation or direct statement that improper proposals had been made to him by representatives of the Roman Catholic Church to the effect that he could get an extension of the boundaries of Manitoba in consideration of reestablishing separate schools; or that he had himself made overtures to the Roman Catholic hat if they would get an extension of boundaries for the Province he would reestablish separate schools, the Premier said that no one had ever approached him from His Grace the Archbishop of St. Boilface to ask for such. Nor had he ever made proposals to repeal the act of 1896 to his grace or to anyone else authorized to speak for the Roman Catholic Church.

"It" said Mr. Roblin, "in such denial, it, is possible to use language mere explicit, then I wish such language to be considered as having been used."

SBARRETTI AND BORDEN.

Alleged Conference Prior to Introduction of Autonomy Bills.

Montreal, April 15.—The Star publishes the following under a Winnipeg date: "It is understood that Mr. R. L. Borden, M. P., and Mgr. Sbarretti. Papal Ablegate, had an interview respecting the autonomy bills for the Territories previous to Sir Wilfrid Laurier's introduction of that measure in the House. It is further understood that the interview, like that held with Hon. C. H. Campbell, of Manitoba, was at the request of the Pope's representative.

"The statement is made that Mgr. Sbarretti sought to enlist Mr. Borden's aid with respect to the disabilities under which the Catholics of the west are alleged to rest.

"Mr. Borden is reported to have given the Papal Ablegate a respectful and attentive hearing, after which he is said to have pointed sut that the constitutional aspect of the case must necessarily govern, and that, while fully sympathizing with any legitimate steps taken to obtain redress of grievances under which any class of citizens rested, he was unable to sapply

ances under which any class of dil-zens rested, he was unable to apply or suggest any other remedy than that which the act governing the case would indicate."

BOER GENERAL SENTENCED. W. J. De Jongh Imprisoned for Passing Bad Checks.

Chicago, April 15.—Gen. W. J. de Jongh, Boer conmander in Griqualand during the recent war and a nephew of the chief justice of Cape Colony, was sentenced by Judge Barnes yesterday to serve a year in the house of correction on the charge of inducing saloonkeepers to chair worthless checks. Assistant State's Attorney Holt and Jailer Whitman, who until the trial were the only persons who knew of the prisoner's identity, asked for clemency.

A SECOND EARTHQUAKE.

Great Loss of Life Reported From Sultanpur in the Punjab.

London, April 15.—A despatch from Lucknow to The Standard says it is reported there that a second earthquake has wrecked Sultanpur, Province of Oudh, and Kulu. Province of Punjab, and that there has been great loss of life.


