POSTOFFICE DEPARTMENT.

By an act of the Imperial Parliament the management of the postal system in the colonies was transferred to the various Provinces. After the Confederation the Post-office Act was passed, the above department was formed, and uniform postal regulations and rates were established for the Dominion.

INLAND REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

This department was formed July 1, 1867. It has control of all excise duties, internal taxes, standard weights and measures; the collection of bridge, ferry tolls and rents; the administration of the laws affecting the measurements of timber, masts, spars, staves, etc.; the inspection of petroleum, gas and gas meters; the administration of the laws affecting the inspection of certain staple articles of Canadian produce, viz.: flour and meal, wheat and other grains; beef and pork, pot ashes and pearl ashes, pickled fish and fish oil, butter, leather and raw hides, apples and cheese.

The administration of the laws respecting the adulteration of food, drugs, etc.

RAILWAYS AND CANALS DEPARTMENT

Constituted a separate department in 1870. Its work is comprised in the conduct and maintenance of the Government railways, the Intercolonial, Windsor Branch Railway, and the Prince Edward Island Railway,

comprising in all 1,397 miles; the supervision and inspection of the various lines in course of construction, under Government subsidy, and the administration of the several provisions of the Railway Act in regard to railways; the compilation and publication of railway statistics, and the construction, maintenance and operation of the various canals in Canada.

After Confederation all the Imperial troops were withdrawn, and at present are represented by a garrison at Halifax and a naval establishment there and on the Pacific Coast.

By the British North America Act the Department of Militia and Defence was established, Sir George E. Cartier being the first Minister.
