HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Domindon Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Territories, excepting 8 and 36, which has not been homesteaded, or reserved to provide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homosteaded or family, or any male over 16 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter sec-tion of 180 cares, more or less than the pro-

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the District in which the land to be taken in situate, or if the homesteader desires he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Citawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the Local Agent for the district in which the land is not such as authority for some onto make surry for bias. HOMESTEAD DUTIES.

A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act and the amendmenta thereto to perform the conditions connected herewith, under one of the following plans:—

At least six months' residence upon and ultivation of the land in each year during the erm of three years.

(2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased or any person who is eligible to make a homescade entry upon the provisions of this Act, residence and the provision of the Act, residence and for by such person as a hone-stead, the requirements of this Act as non-sidence prior to obtaining patient may be satisfied by such person residing with the father astatisfied by such person residing with the father.

(3) If a settler has obtained a patent for his homestead, or a certificate for the issue of such patent countersigned in themismed to such patent countersigned in themismed to for a second homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be extined by residence upon the first homestead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity of the size.

(4) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his household, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

A settler who avails himself of the provision of Clauses (2) (3) or (4) must cultivate 30 acres of his homestead, or substitute 20 head of stock with buildings for their accommodation, and have besides 80 acres substantially fenced.

Every homesteader who fails to comply with the requirements of the homesteader law is liable to have his entry cancelled, and the land may be again thrown open for entry.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT
