Latest Intelligence.

The R. M. steamer A-1A arrived on Thursday evening in the very short space of 30 hours from Boston.

The new steamer Atlantic, of Collin's line, arrived at New York on Tuesday morning, having accomplished the voyage from Liverpool in eleven days. Her announcement by telegraph created considerable excitement, and her approach to the wharf was witnessed by thousands of spectators.

The Rev. John N. Maffit died at Mobile on the 25th ult., after a few hours' illness, of apoplexy of the heart.

By the latest intelligence from California we learn that over a million of dollars in gold dust were shipped at Panama, for the United States Mint, on the 1st May.

Great excitement prevailed at San Francisco on the 30th April, the day on which the first Charter election took place.

A correspondent of the New York Herald states, that a report had reached San Francisco that a party have discovered a mountain, near Los Angeles, which is composed of a mixture of gold, silver and quartz.

A serious affray occurred at Chagres, between the Americans and some of the natives of Panama, in which two Americans and several natives were killed, and a few of each wounded.

Kingston, Jamaica, May 25.—The condition of our markets is unsettled and unsatisfactory; particularly as relates to the article of fish. We have now in first hands about no less than six entire cargoes, and this enormous quantity, as might be supposed, has had the effect of depressing the market to a degree that renders sales impossible.

Cuba.—The New York Herald says—From all the information we have received, we have no longer any doubt that the Cuba invasion, insurrection, &c. is all settled; and so effectually, that there is no probability of any further attempts at invasion for the next ten years.

General Lopez has been arrested in New Orleans, and will undoubtedly be tried for his crimes against our laws.

Out of the persons captured from the Lopez party Expedition, 4 were shot; one was reprieved for some reason unknown. These men, it was said, were not soldiers, but sailors, who had wandered from the boat and had been kept behind. They were returning leisurely to the shore when they were arrested and shot.

All the officers and men engaged in the fight against Lopez were liberally rewarded—the officers receiving crosses of honour—the men, money. Those wounded were pensioned for life, and also the widows and children of those killed.

Some apprehensions are entertained of a hostile movement on the part of the Cuban Spaniards against Haytien Souleuvre, and in favour of the Spanish population of St. Domingo. The United States agent, Mr. Green, has returned to communicate with the U. S. Government.
