Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards on Monday were 125 carloads, 2311 cattle, 1061 hogs, 30 sheep and lambs, 162 calves and 117 horses. Butchers' Cattle-There would be ally 2000 cattle out of the 2500 of bovine class that were offered as fat There was a fair representation of those classed as good, but not as many of the choice as buyers would like to have seen Choice heavy steers, \$8.25 to \$8.65; choice butchers' cattle. \$8 to \$8.25; good butchers, \$7.75 to \$8; medium butchers, \$7.40 to \$7.65; common butchers, \$6.55 to \$7; choice cows, \$6.75 to \$7: good cows, \$6.25 to \$6.50; medium cows, \$5.59 te \$5.85; common cows, \$5 to \$5.50; canners and cutters,, \$4 to \$4.50; choice bulls, \$7 to \$7.25; good bulls, \$6.50 to \$6.75; common bulls, \$5.25 to \$5.75. Stockers and Feeders .- Receipts these were light, but from sales reported prices were very firm, and more would have sold. Choice feeders, 800 to 950 lbs., \$7.25 to \$7.50; stockers, 700 to 800 lbs., \$6.75 to \$7; yearlings of good quality and color, \$6.50 to \$6.75. Milkers and Springers-Only a limited. number of these came forward. The choice ones sold readily, while, as usual, the common and medium were slow sale altho they sold in many instances more than they are worth. Choice milkers and springers, \$85 to \$100; good cows, \$65 to \$75; common sows \$50 to \$60. Veal Calves-Choice veal calves. \$19.50 to 11.50; good calves, \$9 to \$10: medium \$8 to \$9; common, \$4.50 to \$6; heavy fat calves, \$6.50 to \$7.50. Sheep and Lambs .- There was not enough to mak a market. Light sheep, \$9 to \$10.25; heavy sheep, \$7 to \$8; culls; \$6 to \$6.50; choice lambs, \$11.50 to \$13.25; cull lambs, \$9 to \$10; spring lambs \$10 to \$11.50 each.
