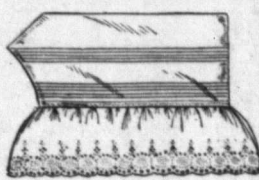

THEY'RE ALL KICKING! New Revenue Bill Has Raised a Storm in all Directions.

The discussion all over the country
is the Government's new revenue bill.
Some approve of it, but with the excep-
tion of the banks all those affected are
preparing to enter a vigorous protest.
The problem in Chatham now is, will
the extra \$1,800 the Government wants
from this city come out of the pockets
of the license holders or out of the city
treasury.
"We do not expect the Government's
license bill will make any difference in
the amount of our license," said a
local hotel-keeper to The Planet.
"How is that?"
"Why, it is the city that will have
to pay the difference. A license now
costs us \$350. The Government takes
out of that \$116.67, and leaves the city
the rest. Now, all that Mr. Harcourt
proposes is that out of the \$350 the
Government will get \$216.67 instead of
\$116.67. Of course the council might
raise the license to \$450 to cover the
extra hundred, but it is no use of them
doing it, because the hotel-keepers are
paying all they can afford to pay
now."

RAILWAYS HIT HARD.
A Montreal despatch says:—Among
those here chiefly interested are the
two big railways. To the Grand Trunk
especially the tax of \$15 a mile will
be a staggerer. The company has not
yet had time to consider what steps
it shall take. Mr. Hays is in Europe,
and until he can be communicated with
by cable no decision will be come to.
Meantime his assistant is preparing a
statement to be sent to the Legisla-
ture setting forth the company's po-
sition, which will be made public as soon
as possible.

POLICY HOLDERS MUST PAY.

the companies will simply have the ef-
fect of taxing the policy-holders. The
premium rates will either have to be
increased or the profits to policy-hold-
ers decreased. It is a matter in which
the policy-holders are more concerned
than any individual life insurance com-
pany."

WRECK OF THE ILL-FATED LABRADOR.

Coolness of the Officers and Crew Prevented any Loss of Life—An
Exciting Experience.

Tobemorey, Scotland, March 3.—
Captain Erskine has sent the following
despatch to the agents of the steamer
at Liverpool:
Labrador ran on Mackenzie rock in a
thick fog at 7 o'clock yesterday morn-
ing, 4 miles from Skerryvore. The ship
was caught amidships, the sea break-
ing over her. Holds No. 1, 2, and 3,
were soon full of water. The passen-
gers and crew were saved in the boats.
One boat load was landed at Skerryvore
lighthouse. The German steamer Vik-
ing picked up the remainder. No
ship is obtainable to return for the
passengers. If the ship is not broken
up, will endeavor to save the mails
when a steamer is obtained.
LOST IN THE FOG.
The Labrador had a good passage
until Sunday, when she entered a fog
and was driven ashore. The steering
wheel was mistaken for instru-
ment light, on the north of Ireland.
Most of the passengers were still in
bed when the steamer struck, and
there was much excitement, but the
passengers were calmed by the assur-
ances of the captain, the boats were
lowered without a hitch, and all on
board left the steamer in safety.
The passengers and crew lost every-
thing they possessed.
Captain Erskine endeavored to save
the mails, but was obliged to abandon
