on trucks to the River St. Lawrence.
We regret that some means should be
adopted to keep the Queen on Charle-
ston. We believe that had the boat
been kept at Charleston Village, and
placed in the hands of a reliable man,
the boat could have been made to
pay a fair dividend. The majority of
the parties to the lake want to
charter the boat to the village and
expense in getting the boat to the vil-
lage rendered the matter of engagement for
use one of difficulty and delay.
We are satisfied that if some of the cars
men who intend making a living out
of the letting of boats, were to pur-
chase a small coal oil steamer capable
of carrying 15 or 20 persons comfort-
ably, that they could make good pay-
ing investment out of the speculation.
The trouble with the Outlet Queen
was that she was larger than the re-
quirements of the lake called for and
was too expensive for small parties.
A coal oil steamer could be run at
great profit for from \$5 to \$7 per day
which would be cheaper and handier
for the majority of picnic parties than
hiring a number of small boats.
