Wavy Hair.  
Of very great assistance in attaining  
that desirable waviness which nature  
has denied some heads of hair is tar  
water. The deprived ones may apply  
this liquid once a day. It cannot hurt  
the hair, for it is a tonic as well as a  
sure wave producer. To make it get  
from the druggist a five cent box of  
white pine tar; pour the contents into a  
bottle (a quart size) of hot water; let  
stand until cold. The tar will cling to  
the bottom of the bottle. Do not shake,  
as you will get the full substance and  
strength of the tar without shaking.  
Just use the water from the tar. To  
use put a little in a small vessel and  
rub into the scalp of the head and on  
the hair with a brush. One a little  
larger than a toothbrush will do.  
While the hair is wet push it forward  
and press it with the fingers. When  
the water is all used replace with hot  
water again. The same tar should last  
for three months, with renewals of wa-  
ter when necessary.
