NOTICE!

The members of the Wolfville Volunteer Fire and Protection Company wish to call the attention of the public to Section 6 of Chapter 81 of the Revised Statutes 1900, "Of the Use of Roads," which reads as follows:

"Officers and men of any fire department of any city, town, municipality or district when going to any fire with engines or other fire apparatus shall have the right of way on any street, road or highway and any person who wilfully or negligently obstructs or retards the passage of any such engine or apparatus shall be liable to a penalty of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars."
