TEAMS' BATTLING HARD FOR FLAG

New York, Sept. 1—The beginning of another week of play in the two major leagues finds the first division clubs in each circuit in the same relative positions as a week ago.

The Boston Braves in the National league and the Boston Red Sox in the American have respectively made the best showings in their circuits, with the difference that the American league representatives already were at the top and have maintained their position, while the world's champions are playing an uphill game and still have some distance to go.

While Stallings' men are making a fine fight of it, ground they gained on the Philadelphia leaders during the seven-day period was so small that it will have to be bettered in the weeks to come if the Bostonians are to go ahead of Pat Moran's team.

Less impressive for some weeks was the showing of the equally ambitious Brooklyn. Their even break in eight games cost them a few percentage points, and they are further away from the leaders than they were last Sunday, while the Bostonians, in third place, are apparently nearer to the second position holders.

The Phillies, with five games won and two lost, made their chief gain at the expense of the Cincinnati, from whom they took four straight games. These more than made up for the two out of three which they dropped to Chicago early in the week.

In the American league the Boston bearded the Detroit Tigers in their den and took the honors in an exciting three-game series, one of the contests running to twelve and another to thirteen innings. Moving on to Cleveland, the Red Sox met with a setback on Friday but more than made up this good Saturday by taking a doubleheader from the Indians and topped off the series with a Sunday victory by 1 to 0.

The Brooklyn Feds are after Stuff McInnis, the clever little first sacker of the Athletics, and it is reported they have offered a big salary and a bonus of \$5000 for signing a three-year contract.

"JOCKO" VINSON IS AT SHORCLIFFE.

"Jocko" Vinson, a one-time trainer of athletes at the Vancouver Athletic Club and for a number of years a resident of Nanaimo, who went to the front early in the war, and who was wounded in the ankle, is now at Shorcliffe, England, training members of the second Canadian contingent in trench-digging. And all the athletes who knew "Jocko" and they are legion, as a trainer of athletes, will know that he's showing the boys of the second contingent some new tricks. "Punch" Burns, of the V. A. C., received a letter from "Jocko" the other day, and the old, limnet slinger says he's hepping around on one foot and giving orders and teaching the second contingent how to make war-sawers. "And you can just bet," says "Punch," that when he gets through with them there will be no slouches at trench-digging."

COWLER VICTOR.

New York, Sept. 2—Tom Cowler, from England, defeated Jack Hemple of San Francisco, in the third round of a ten-round match here last night. The referee stopping the fight to save Hemple from a knockout. Hemple displayed great gameness. He was knocked down three times in the first round and twice in the third before the referee's action. Cowler weighed 211 pounds and Hemple 136.

PROVINCIAL FOREST FIRES UNDER CONTROL

Victoria, Sept. 2—Telegraphic advices to the Hon. the Minister of Lands, record hot and dry weather with few exceptions throughout the province; fires for the most part, however, being under control. In the Lillooet District, all burning permits have been cancelled as a precautionary measure. From Kamloops word has been received that a fire in the Blue Valley district, started by lightning was threatening timber limits, but although difficult of access is now under control. With the exception of the lower Thomson country, occasional showers are keeping the fires in check in the Kamloop forest district, and a similar condition prevails in the Cranbrook division. Thunder storms with destructive lightning have caused many fires in the Fort George country, and a further report is expected. Many fires in the Vancouver provincial forest district are reported, but outbreaks having occurred at Reid, Valdez, Thurlow, and Texada Islands, also at Campbell River, Gordon Pass, Lake, Potlatch Creek, Gambler Island, Smith's Landing, Seymour Creek, North Arm, Ardley, Burnaby, White Rock, Townsend, Surrey, Sperling, Bradner, Langley, Abbotford and Aldergrove, in addition to a number of smaller fires. Houses were burnt at Gambler Island, Burnaby, North Vancouver, Newton, Abbotford White Rock, Bradner, Langley. These fires are now under control, and were in slash without any appreciable loss of timber. In the Vancouver Island forest district all fires are for the most part under control, with little damage to green timber.

Weather forecasts predict continuation of fine, warm weather, but all possible precautions are being taken to keep fires under control and to detect and extinguish new outbreaks.
