## INFLUX AMERICAN LABOR TO MEXICO

Unemployment in United States  
Causes Many to Return to  
Mexico

Mexico City, March 8.—An influx of  
American labor to Mexico, especially  
to the oil regions, is causing much  
concern to government officials who  
are receiving complaints daily from  
Mexican workmen and organizations that  
the presence of the foreigners is  
working a hardship on native labor.  
It is asserted that unemployment  
in the United States has caused thou-  
sands of Mexicans to return to the  
republic, many of them in destitute  
circumstances. Arriving here they  
find large numbers of Americans hold-  
ing the jobs which, they declare, are  
rightfully theirs.

Moreover, in the oil fields Amer-  
ican labor has practically supplanted  
native workmen and the charge has  
been made publicly by labor repre-  
sentatives that the Americans in these  
regions are fully armed and are on  
"war basis" for the ostensible pur-  
pose of protecting foreign holdings.  
A fantastic charge made in this  
connection is that these workmen are,  
in reality, United States soldiers who  
have been placed here "to watch  
eventualities."

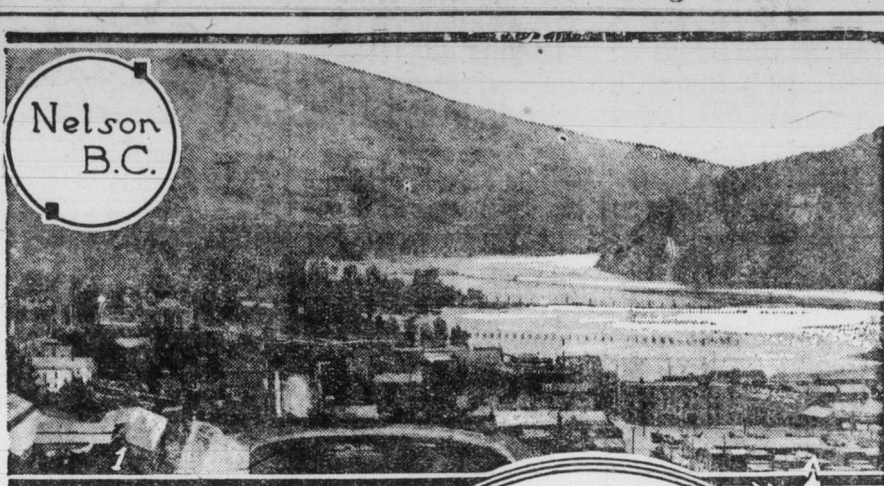

## Nelson and the Kootenay



The name Kootenay has long been  
familiar to the mining and lumber-  
ing worlds. Kootenay has extensive,  
varied and rich mineral deposits and  
every valley and mountain side is a  
store-house of valuable timber. The  
city of Nelson, on the Kootenay Lake,  
is the distributing centre for the dis-  
trict, from which the wholesale trade  
of the interior is carried on. Nelson  
owns the public utilities, electric  
light, street railway, water works  
and gas works. Special attention is  
given to the forestry department in  
guarding the timber resources of the  
district. With an unlimited supply  
of wood in the mountains, there is a  
great future in the pulp industry.  
Within a radius of twenty-five miles,  
there are twenty-five saw mills in  
operation. The Board of Trade of  
Nelson is now in communication with  
New York capitalists regarding the  
establishment of a pulp mill. Tri-  
butary to the proposed mill site are  
11,200 square miles of territory from  
which there are a number of forest  
products. The region embracing about  
forty thousand people, is fairly well  
spread over the entire area. There  
are about 15,000 inhabitants in ten  
towns and the balance are scattered  
on homesteads, ranches, lumber and  
mining camps through the district.  
Many in order to obtain working  
capital, accept contracts for delivery  
of logs, trees, shingles, cedar poles  
and other products from their lands  
and there are a number of forest  
product operators around the lake.  
It is computed that nearly 14 million  
cords of pulpwood could be secured,  
enough to last one hundred and fifty  
years, figuring three hundred cords  
per day.  
The maximum distance of raw mate-  
rial from Nelson is sixty-five miles  
with an average of thirty-five miles.  
There are excellent railroad connec-  
tions to market, and there is abun-  
dant electric power. The most im-  
portant power development in the  
interior of British Columbia is at  
the West Kootenay Power and  
Light at Bonnington Falls. Power  
and light are furnished to Trail,  
Roseland, Grand Forks, Phoenix,  
Greenwood, Boundary Falls, the

smelters and mines forming much  
the largest consuming area. There  
are openings for the manu-  
facture of wooden ware. A saw and  
door factory of Nelson are branch-  
ing out this year into the manu-  
facture of wash-board, screen doors,  
brooms and various wooden articles  
and that a large business of this kind  
can be developed is assured.  
The Kootenay can make other ap-  
peals to the world. Fortunes are  
still to be made by so a little before  
precious metals from the earth and  
hewing the trees from her hillside  
has been another treasure to offer  
in the fertile valleys that girdle
