It is impossible to give advice in a case like this to all, as certain complexions are especially sensitive to some one ingredient which is scotting to others. Glycerine is extremely irritating to many compexions because of the tendency it has to dry the skin. This may be partly overcome by mixing it with a certain amount of rose water. But simple cold cresm is one the most suitable and barmof the most suitable and harm-less things that can be put upon the skin, furnishing the pores as it does with needed nourishment, and there are very few complexions, except only ones, with which it does not agree. Oily complexions need no lotion of any kind, but they should be wiped with cologue and dusted with some simple powder to remedy this defect, which becomes a painful disfigurement in warm weather.
