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## BAPTIST DISTRICT ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the United Baptists of the 10th District, met in the Whitneyville Church, Thursday and Friday, July 10th and 11th. The meeting on Thursday night was presided over by the chairman, Rev. H. E. Allaby and a large congregation was present. The opening exercises were led by the chairman, assisted by D. C. Kaine and Rev. W. Camp.

Rev. R. W. Hopkins of Upper Blackville delivered the annual sermon taking his text from Psalm 104. Let my meditation be sweet unto Him. This was an address of particular merit and was delivered in Mr. Hopkins' original and pleasing manner.

The chairman appointed the standing committees as follows: Nominating—H. W. B. Smith, D. C. Kaine, H. F. Whitney.

Resolutions—Revs. Camp and Kinley.

The secretary then presented the program, which was adopted. The offering was taken, amounting to \$9.35.

Rev. W. C. Machum, the newly appointed secretary of Sunday School and young people's work, was called to the platform and addressed the meeting on "The Importance of Religious Character." Although this was Mr. Machum's first visit to the District, in his initial address he enlisted the cooperation of his audience in the important work he has undertaken. The meeting closed with the benediction by Rev. J. G. A. Belyea.

The choir rendered appropriate music throughout the session.

The meeting on Friday morning was presided over by Rev. H. E. Allaby. Prayer was offered by D. C. Kaine, L.C. The business of the day was then taken up. The courtesies of the gathering were extended to Miss Machum, Rev. J. G. A. Belyea, and other visitors. Church letters were read by Mr. Haviland Hovey. These letters were discussed by Revs. Camp, Kinley, Belyea, and Weaver and D. C. Kaine. At the juncture business was suspended and a delightful devotional half hour was conducted by Rev. G. S. Weaver. At 11:50 a. m. business was resumed. The new workers, Miss Esther Clarke, first lady preacher in the province, Mr. D. C. Keane, licence of the 10th District, Rev. R. W. Hopkins, pastor at Upper Blackville, and Rev. G. S. Weaver, pastor at Whitneyville were fittingly welcomed by the chairman. Each worker responded appreciatively.

Allotments for the coming year were proposed and adopted.

The new chairman was then installed.

The retiring chairman, Rev. Mr. Allaby, then addressed the meeting on Sacrifice, Union and Reconstruction. A co-operative Committee on S. S. Work was appointed, consisting of—Rev. H. E. Allaby, Miss Clark, and Mr. John Corney.

The chairman spoke appreciatively of the spirit and work of Miss Clarke at Grangeville.

In the Friday session, Rev. J. G. A. Belyea, Secretary of the N. B. Association, addressed the meeting on Home Missions, in which address he reviewed the history and present work of Home Missions in this province.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was read and adopted as follows:

Resolved: That this meeting put itself on record as appreciating the action of our Federal Government in bringing forward a law providing for Dominion wide Prohibition and for the determined stand which the members of the committee have taken to have it placed on our Statute Books. We also wish to record our disgust at the action of the Senate in standing in the way of this measure, the enactment of which is of vital importance to the welfare of Canada during the time of reconstruction.

Resolved:—That this meeting express its heartfelt Christian sympathy to Rev. H. E. and Mrs. Allaby, in the loss of their baby girl, the surprise of whose life God loaned them for such a short time, and also to the families throughout the District, who during the past serious year have been forced to bow their heads in sorrow for the loss of their loved ones.

Resolved: That we the officers and delegation of the District meeting tender our hearty thanks to the pastor and people of the Whitneyville Church for the use of their Church building, and for their unbounded hospitality which has made our stay in Whitneyville so pleasant, and also to the choir for their service.

We have learned with deep sorrow the very serious charges laid against the character of Rev. Sterling W. Stackhouse. This offence is said to have been committed while he was pastor of one of our churches. There fore resolved:

That in view of these sworn testimonies before the divorce court and on other occasions without refutation.

And in view of the circumstances attending Mr. Stackhouse's departure from our province. We the members of the Tenth District assembled in our annual gathering express our conviction that until he clears himself of these charges that he be not permitted to exercise the functions of a Baptist Minister and further resolved:

That unless these charges be proved false we request our convention to strike the name of Sterling W. Stackhouse from the list of ordained ministers and that he be regarded a minister of the Gospel no longer among us.

### The Collar

The collar should be just large enough to permit a man's hand to pass inside the collar between the lower end of the collar and the neck or breast of the horse. If the collar is too loose it will cause friction; if too tight it will choke the horse, and cause sore withers. Test the fitting of the collar by lifting up the horse's head.

The harness should fit the collar; if too long, they will probably be buckled too tight at the top, and in this way the collar will be made to pinch the horse at the top. Sores thus produced begin by a pimple or very small boil, often overlooked because the mane covers it.

Examine your horse continually, and if there is any sore spot, adjust the collar so that it will not touch that spot. If the skin is merely wrinkled, bathe it with clean water, containing a little salt.

If the collar "rides up," it can be kept down by a martingale running to the girth, or by an extra girth running from trace to trace, back of the forelegs.

The best collar for a mature horse, whose weight does not vary much throughout the year, is the leather collar. But for the most horses, the best collar is one stuffed with hair, and covered with ticking. With this collar, if the horse's shoulder becomes sore at any point, the lining of the collar can easily be ripped, and the hair removed or pushed aside at that point, so that no pressure will come on the sore place.

Collar pads are much used, but they quickly become dirty, cannot easily be cleaned, and thus cause many sores. Still a pad that makes the collar fit is better than an ill-fitting collar without a pad.

By all means, clean the inside of the collar every night. If you wait until the next morning, you are likely to forget it. Of course you will clean the horse's shoulders as soon as the collar is removed. The salt sweat drying on the skin is what does the mischief.
