LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The C. P. R. at Winnipeg broke its record for marketing grain last Wednesday, when 430,000 bushels were marketed.

H. A. BAYFIELD, C. E., of P. E. Island has been appointed mechanical superintendent of the Montreal Harbor Board.

The French Acadian population of the Maritime Provinces is now about 150,000, an increase during the decade of nearly 40,000.

Mr. A. A. Hilson, Wilnot, shipped one and a half tons of poultry from Summerside on the Northumberland on Friday morning.

The offer of the Royal Canadian Regiment, stationed at Halifax, to go to South Africa has been declined by the Imperial authorities.

The jury in the case of Thomas Lewis, the Christian Scientist, indicted for manslaughter at Toronto, have returned a verdict of guilty.

Mr. Fred. Power, the brakeman of the P. E. I. R. who lost a leg last winter on the railway, has returned from New York with an artificial one.

LE SOLEIL of Montreal, intimates that the elections to fill the vacancies at present existing in the Dominion Parliament will be held almost immediately.

Mr. E. T. Horne, assistant manager of the I. C. R., will be here shortly for the purpose of looking over a site for new terminal railway station buildings at Charlottetown.

The King's birthday was generally observed here. A royal salute was fired from Fort Edward. A salute will also be fired on Dec. 1st in honor of Queen Alexandra's birthday.

The following enumerators have been appointed to take a census of the Fisheries of P. E. I. Kings—J. McCormack, Souris, P. E. I. Prince—John Davison, Judique, P. E. I. Queens—W. W. Hodgson, Charlottetown.

Col. DENT has received a cable from the Imperial authorities instructing him to ship all horses purchased in Canada from a Canadian port. In consequence the shipment arranged to be sent from Portland, Maine, will now be sent from St. John, N. B.

As the result of an application from Mayor Warburton to the Minister of Militia three obsolete 9-pounder guns in the stores department here will be placed in the public gardens. These with the old French gun placed there on Saturday will give the square a decidedly warlike appearance.

Mr. F. F. Cormier of Souris, has secured the right to sell and manufacture the O'Donnell patent washing machine. He claims that this machine is superior to anything of the kind ever offered to the public and in several weeks time he will begin a tour of the Province, selling the machine.

In the final football match of the League series at the C. A. A. grounds on Saturday afternoon the St. Dunstan's College team defeated the Abegweit by a score of 3 to 0, winning the trophy and championship of the Province. The play was very sharp on both sides and good tackling and some splendid runs were made.

The score for St. Dunstan's was brought about by a touch-down by McPherson.

A SYDNEY despatch says: It is understood that the Dominion Steel Co. has about purchased extensive iron ores area at Barransum, which is at present owned by Rev. Father McPherson. According to the arrangement the Steel Company will have epperty at the mines within two months ascertaining the quality and quantity of iron there. If the experts make a favorable report Father McPherson will get one hundred thousand dollars for the property.

The business portion of the town of Pugwash, N. S., was almost wiped out by fire Sunday night. The fire was discovered in the Elliott Block at 8.40 p. m., and inside of four hours thirty-five thousand dollars worth of property was destroyed.

The wind was blowing a gale from the northeast, and the town was saved only by the heroic efforts of the crowd present. Seventy-five buildings were destroyed, including some of the finest residences. The origin of the fire is unknown. The insurance only covers one third of the loss.

This experiment of Dr. Saunders, Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa, is planting trees on Sable Island, the "Graveyard of the Atlantic," with the idea that if these trees and shrubs would grow, they would have the effect of binding the soil of the island together and prevent that change in the conformation of the island which has been so puzzling to mariners of late years, promises to be a success. Reports received at the Department of Marine recently indicate that the young trees, with the exception of the pines, are doing very well. In a few years it is felt this experiment will have made quite a change in the appearance of the island.

Enos HILTZ, cook of the schooner Kimberley, which was loading at Souris last week for Messrs. Matthew & McLean, lost his life by drowning on Wednesday night. He retired to bed about 10 o'clock that night, but was not to be seen the next morning. Search revealed his body in the water alongside the vessel, where it is supposed that he must have accidentally fell some time during the night. An inquest was held Thursday morning and a verdict of accidental death was pronounced. The deceased was a native of Mahone Bay, N. S., and leaves a wife and three children. His body was sent on to his late home for burial.

Mr. JOHN F. CHAMBERLAIN, of Denver, Colorado, is very ill, the result of an abscess which formed in his ear. Mr. Chamberlain is one of the rich men of the state. His principal holding is the Little Johnnie mine at Leadville. He is the largest individual stockholder, owning one fourth interest, from which he derives an approximate net revenue of \$1,000 a day. In addition he is largely interested in many other mines and in the best sugar industry. He owns a newspaper and much real estate in Denver and Leadville. He has a wife and three children. His home at Eighth St., Pennsylvania is one of the finest residences in the city.—Denver Post.

The title of Prince of Wales was conferred on the Duke of Cornwall and York by his Majesty the King on Saturday last, his own birthday. This will be the title of the heir apparent until he succeeds his father as king.

The last of the series of jubilee processions in connection with the jubilee, was held at St. Dunstan's on Sunday last. His Lordship the Bishop and Rev. Dr. Morrison conducted the exercises. There was a very large attendance.

A SYDNEY despatch of the 8th states that the schooner John Cabot, which left Rose Bunches for Sydney about three weeks ago, and which was to land Father O'Regan at Chatham on a sacerdotal mission, is reported bottom up off Burnt Island, Newfoundland. All hands must have perished.

Rev. Thomas E. Cullen, son of Mr. Patrick Cullen, of this city and at one time Principal of Queen's Square School, was ordained to the priesthood at the diocesan seminary of St. Paul Minnesota on Friday last. He said his first Mass at St. Joseph's Church, St. Paul, on Sunday. Ad multos annos.

The War Department has contracted for half a million bushels of oats from farmers between Calgary and Edmonton, Man. The farmers are guaranteed a net price of not less than 24c. a bushel. Contracts have also been made for 15,000 tons of hay both commodities to be shipped to South Africa next month.

King Edward celebrated his birthday by creating the Duke of Cornwall Prince of Wales and Earl of Chester as a reward for the Duke's accomplished mission to the Colonies. The King, Queen, Prince and Princess of Wales spent the day at Sandringham. There was no observance of the day except firing salutes and ringing church bells.
