BORDEN CABINET SWORN BY GOVERNOR TODAY

Hon. Robert Rogers is Minister of the Interior, W. T. White Takes Finance Portfolio and Hon. Geo. E. Foster is Minister of Trade and Commerce.

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—The ceremony of swearing the new government took place at noon today at Government House. The ministers drove to the vice-regal residence and were received in the reception room by His Excellency Earl Grey, who was attended by his aides-de-camp...

Mr. Rodolphe Boudreau, clerk of the privy council, was present and took the official record of the proceedings. The rubric upon which the oaths of office were taken were presented to the ministers as souvenirs.

After His Excellency had felicitated the ministers individually they came back to the city and most of them took formal possession of the departments. The initial meeting of the new cabinet will be held at noon tomorrow...

Ontario, Oct. 10.—Yesterday saw some sudden last hour changes in regard to the Borden cabinet. Rival aspirants and factions have been busy all day advising and counter advising the harassed and perplexed "man at the wheel" as to the selection of his cabinet...

The swearing in of the new ministers will take place about noon, this being the last official act of His Excellency before he leaves for Montreal on the 11th inst. The annual alteration of the portfolio is still in doubt and will not be known definitely until the ministers take the oath of office.

The revised slate, unofficially announced, is as follows:— Maritime Provinces—R. L. Borden and Hon. J. D. Reid. Quebec—Hon. G. E. Foster, Ex-Judge C. J. Doherty, F. D. Monk and L. P. Pelletier.

Ontario—Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Hon. Frank Cochrane, W. T. White, Col. Sam Hughes and D. J. Reid. Manitoba—Mr. J. Roche. Saskatchewan—Hon. R. Rogers. Alberta—Hon. J. A. Lougheed. British Columbia—Merrill Burrell. Solicitor General—Bruno Nantel.

In addition there may be two taken in without portfolios, the names of Armstrong and Middlebro being most prominently suggested. Changes from the previous forecast are the taking in of Col. Hughes and Dr. J. D. Reid, from Ontario, instead of Andrew Broder and Middlebro or Armstrong. The selection of Col. Hughes, who will, of course, go to the militia department, is primarily because Mr. Borden found that he could not overlook the Colonel's undoubted qualifications for the position.

No other among the previous aspirants had any military experience, and Col. Hughes' long parliamentary experience and front bench rank demanded recognition. The turning down of Andrew Broder for the agriculture portfolio is the most surprising development of the day and has occasioned much adverse criticism. Mr. Broder has always been regarded as the natural selection for this portfolio, and is the only real representative of the farmers whom Mr. Borden could choose.

Broder has all along declared his willingness to serve in the ranks, and has apparently been sacrificed to the demands of the member for Grenville, who had the backing of Sir Hugh Graham and Rodolphe Forget. Strong criticism of rank and file Conservatives at the inclusion of White in the cabinet also probably influenced Mr. Borden to appease the kickers by rewarding such old party fighters as Col. Hughes and Dr. Reid.

The agriculture portfolio will now almost certainly go to Martin Burrell, who is a fruit grower and who is the only man in the cabinet with any qualification to represent the farming community.

The Quebec representatives were finally decided only after a series of separate conferences of the rival and contending factions with Mr. Borden, extending all day.

Concessions to Nationalists. The Nationalist element of Mr. Borden's support have all along been demanding their pound of flesh. They wanted both Monk and Nantel in the cabinet and Hon. Mr. Pelletier chosen instead of Forget's candidate, Chase Casparin. Moreover there was a demand that Monk be given the portfolio of public works in stead of a position of less influence and importance. Whether or not this was granted by Mr. Borden is still unknown, but it is significant that Forget left for Montreal in the afternoon in evident ill-humor in an endeavor to finally satisfy the Nationalists and preserve their support. It is understood that Borden has agreed to give the solicitor generalship to Mr. Nantel, instead of A. A. McLean, of Prince Edward Island, as was his original intention.

It is generally expected that the cabinet which Mr. Borden will announce today will be subject to changes later on. Hon. Geo. E. Foster is slated for the chairmanship of the proposed large commission on Hon. J. Hazen will probably go to the Supreme Court bench when a vacancy occurs, and Dr. Reid may go to the National Transcontinental Railway Commission.

This would open the way for the calling to the cabinet later of Broder, Crocker, and one or others of the presently disappointed Ontario aspirants. As has been previously stated, E. W. Crothers would be satisfied with the speakership of the Commons. Sir Wilfrid Laurier went to Montreal on private business. He will not go to Quebec with the members of the new government to meet the Duke of Connaught, but will participate in the 10th civic and government reception to His Royal Highness on his arrival here.

Worked at 11 Till Midnight. Ottawa, Oct. 10.—R. L. Borden has just completed his cabinet-making labors, following a series of conferences with his chief lieutenants, and at midnight drove to Rideau Hall, where he presented the list to the Governor-General. It was approved by His Excellency, and the new cabinet will be sworn in by Earl Grey at Government House today.

Mr. Borden's Courtesy. Ottawa, Oct. 10.—When the official list of those to go down to Quebec to meet His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught was submitted to Earl Grey, he noticed that the names of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Lady Laurier had been omitted by the state department. The premier at once called to have the omission rectified and has placed a government car at the disposal of Sir Wilfrid. It is probable that the ex-premier will accept the generous offer and go to Quebec.

DECLARES HOME RULE MEANS SEPARATION. Former Chief Secretary for Ireland Assails Home Rule Cause—Would Not Allow Return to Ottawa Unless Status Canada or Austraila. London, Oct. 9.—Walter Long, P.C., M.P., one of the leading members of Ireland, opening a anti-home rule campaign at Darlington yesterday, pointed out that self-government for Ireland, along the lines of Canada and Australia, meant the virtual separation of that country. Could not Canada tomorrow, if she chose to do so, asked Mr. Long, "throw down the British flag? You know perfectly well that all the soldiers and sailors in the world and all its statesmen could not prevent Canada, Australia or South Africa taking their own line." The great colonies, however, had no intention of doing anything of the kind, for they loved the mother country and meant to stand by her. But wise people ought not to be content with securities of that kind, for in certain circumstances they would regret it with bitter tears. If Canada, Australia, or the Union of South Africa, were to leave the Mother Country, it would not interfere with the security of her defence. But was it so with Ireland? Could they regard the prospect of the separation of Ireland with the same comparative equanimity as they do that of the colonies? Ireland was a part of themselves. She was as much a part of the country as were Lancashire, Yorkshire and Durham. Strathcona's Fast Trip. London, Oct. 10.—Tonight's papers make much of Lord Strathcona's ten thousand mile journey to Ottawa and back in seventeen days.
