Cable News.

LONDON, August 17.
While returning from a memorial service to the wife of Colonel Seeley, General Sir Ian Hamilton was slightly injured by a box falling on his head from the top of his motor. He was able to resume his duties at the War Office yesterday.

HALIFAX, August 17.
A Liverpool cable says the officials of the White Star Steamship Co., decline to affirm or deny the rumor that it is their intention to follow the Cunard Line in an endeavor to abandon Queenstown as a port of call for their steamers.

HALIFAX, August 18.
A cable from London says the fourth cruiser squadron, which is to have Bermuda for its base, and which has been ordered to leave the home ports for its new station Sept. 20th, consists of the armoured cruisers, Suffolk, flying the flag of Rear-Admiral Sir C. Crocock, Berwick and Donegal. It is understood the squadron will cruise around the West Indian Islands, as well as pay occasional visits to Halifax.

HONG KONG, August 17.
Five thousand people are reported to have been killed in the fighting that is going on in Canton and its environs between the government forces and the rebels. Looting continues, and there has been a wholesale destruction of property, among the buildings destroyed being Canton governor's yamen. Residents in the foreign quarter of Canton had many narrow escapes from bursting shells. The rebels hope to embolden the foreigners in the trouble. Prisoners are being led through the streets of Canton by wires running through holes drilled in their noses. This and other methods of torturing the prisoners is common.

MATTEWAN, August 18.
Harry K. Thaw, slayer of Stanford White, escaped from the hospital for criminal insane at 7.45 this morning. The dash for liberty was through an open gate, and then a dash for the open doorway of a powerful auto which stood quivering outside. In a tight like a rocket for the Connecticut State line, 30 miles away, he accomplished his escape. To-night he is still at large, and the hospital authorities feel certain he is outside the State. Once beyond the boundaries he is free. Only months, perhaps of litigation can bring him back to Mattewan, and then only in the event he is adjudged insane in the State to which he has fled.

LONDON, August 18.
Marie Corelli, the authoress, in a fit of blues, sends to the press a wall about the British nation's iniquities. She declares they are satiated with possession, indolent through undisturbed prosperity, and empty-minded

from lack of incentive efforts. The nation, she says, shows the fidelity spirit of age without any of its dignity, sweetness, composure, tenderness or love. In a teasing humor it girds at its former ideals, its fine faith, its poetic dreams and all the romance and beauty that it could once have died to defend and preserve. Unhappily there is no hope for the wretched old sinner because as Miss Corelli says, we are pleased to imagine we are still going forward living in a mist of delusion created by ourselves, and the end of it all is we are near the end of our tether and must furnish soil merely for the growth of a new race.

ALBANY, August 17.
After the epistolary clash which had continued with increased bitterness in their conflict for the sole possession of the chief executive chair and the functions attached thereto, the proposal of William Sulzer, the impeached Governor, that he and his rival lay their respective claims before the courts for speedy settlement, came to grief last night when Governor Glynn, who claims he is acting Governor by virtue of Sulzer's impeachment, notified Sulzer that he had no intention of asking any court to decide the question. "It is beyond my power to barter away any of the functions attached to the office in which I am placed by your impeachment," reads Glynn's reply to Sulzer's suggestion. "I hold myself in readiness to perform, and shall perform every function of the office of Governor, except in so far as I am restrained by your illegal action or by physical force."

MEXICO, CITY, August 17.
Frederick Gamboa, Mexican Minister of Foreign Affairs, gave out the first statement made by any Mexican official regarding the message sent to Provisional President Huerta, by President Wilson, through his personal representative, Lind. He said the Mexican Government would give consideration to the communication, and after fully discussing it would make a reply. This procedure is contrary to the opinion held generally here the past week regarding the Mexican Government's attitude, it being assumed that General Huerta's note of August 6th, in which he characterized Mr. Lind as being persona non grata, unless he brought proper credentials and recognition of Huerta's administration, otherwise he would be ignored. Newspapers in the city betray editorially and in their news columns their bitterness towards the States. This is shown by caricatures published of Mr. Lind, Uncle Sam and Dr. William Bayard Hale. Toward Lind personally there is manifested a feeling that is almost friendly. The public and officials here conceived for him a personal liking, which is reflected in the newspapers. Lind remains uncommunicative to the public, having a fixed determination not to discuss politics with any officials in Mexico.

Crabonear Man Killed in Chelsea.

Charles Jaynes, age 32, carpenter's helper, living at 80 Blossom St., was instantly killed shortly before 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, when he fell 80 feet from a temporary staging in front of Gordon's new theatre in Scollay Sq.

Jaynes attempted to step between two planks when his foot slipped and he plunged headlong into the street, landing head first upon a small platform used for mixing mortar. His skull was fractured and death was instantaneous.

Mr. Jaynes' wife died a few months ago. He leaves three small children and two brothers. Undertaker Carafa brought the body from the North Grove St. morgue to-day and the funeral services will be held at 2.30 tomorrow at 80 Blossom Street.—Chelsea Evening Record, August 5.

Fire Auto Beats Airship In Race.

New York, Aug. 11.—The Broadway crowds between Seventy-seventh street and Seventy-fifth street early Friday night were thrilled and bewildered by a race between an aeroplane and an automobile.

Deputy Fire Chief Burns was in the automobile and George Grey, of Palisades Park, was in the aeroplane. Burns won the race. Sky traffic is getting so heavy at the rush hour now an aviator has to be careful.

The Chief was on his way to a fire in the five-story tenement at No. 21 West Sixty-fifth street. As his machine swung from Seventy-seventh street into Broadway he heard a hall from the heavens and saw Grey's biplane swinging into the course. Grey had made a spectacular flight across the river, and seeing the smoke cloud and hearing the bells he thought he'd go to the fire, too. Biplane and automobile dashed to Sixty-fifth street, Burns in the lead. Grey swung around the burning building, and then sped away across the river.

Glashure has a fond for rare insects and was seeking them on Mount Wilson when caught by the falling tree. His dog ran to the fire warden's cabin on the mountain side.

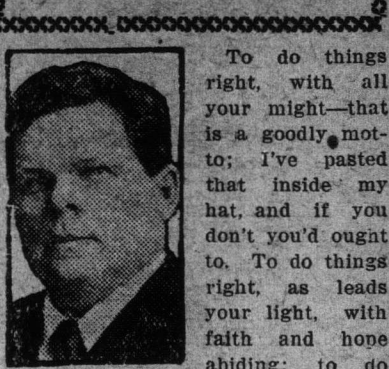
Deputy Warden M. F. Judkins noticed the peculiar antics of the dog and followed him to where Mr. Glashure was pinned. With much difficulty Mr. Glashure was rescued. His injuries are not believed to be serious.

Soldier Crushed Under Gun at Quebec.

Quebec, August 11.—A serious accident occurred to a soldier named Carpenter, of the R. C. G. A., here on Saturday afternoon. A number of his comrades, aided by twelve horses, were moving a sixty-pounder gun from the Lower Town to the Citadel.

Carpenter and another man were seated on top of the piece of artillery. In turning the corner of Chateau avenue the gun capsize. Carpenter was caught beneath it, one of his thighs being badly shattered, while it is feared he received internal injuries. The escort with the gun and men from the central fire station rushed to his assistance and succeeded in extricating him from his painful position. When first aid was administered he was sent to an hospital in an ambulance. The man with him on the gun escaped uninjured.

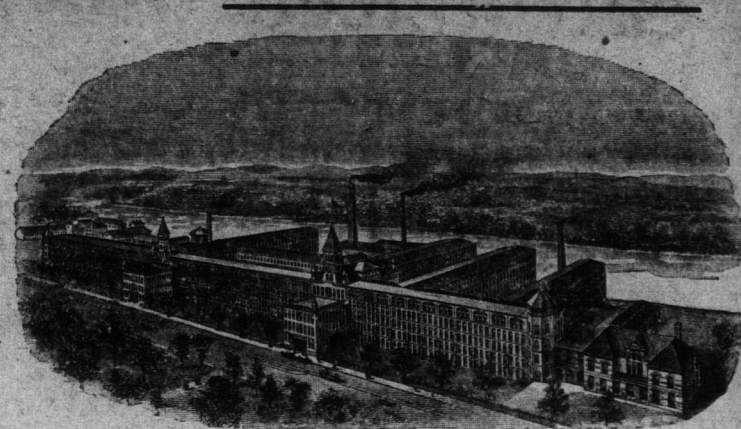
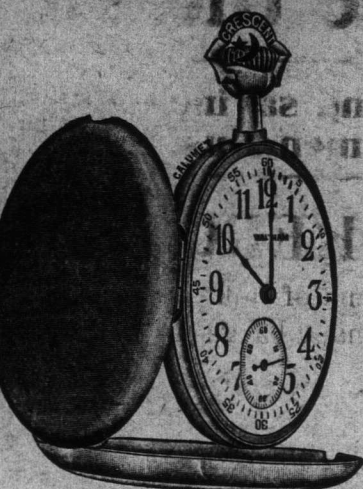
3 Drowned.

Halifax Aug. 11.—Three lives were lost in a drowning accident at Seabright yesterday afternoon when a sailboat overturned in a heavy squall. From the meagre details which reached Halifax early this morning, a man named Collishaw was out sailing with his fifteen year old son, and three year old daughter and their boat overturned in a heavy squall.

Assistance put out from the shore but too late. None of the bodies had been recovered up to late last night. The accident occurred off Collishaw's Point, not far from the Seabright hotel, about twenty seven miles from Halifax. Deep gloom was cast over the large summer colony there by the accident.

There are several families of this name at Seabright and owing to telephonic and telegraphic communication with this place ceasing very early at night, definite details could not be secured until this morning.
