RUSSIANS ON OFFENSIVE AGAIN.

LONDON, To-day.

Except at the Central Beskid Pass of the Carpathians, where the fierce Austrian attacks have moderated somewhat, the Russians are now on the offensive along the whole length of their extremely long line from the Baltic Sea to the Roumanian border. Apparently they have definitely disposed of the German and Austrian attempts to outflank their two extreme wings. The tide having turned they are making slow but steady progress. After retreating on the right bank to the Dniester River, the Russians have crossed into Bukovina and are unofficially reported to be back in Vyznawitz, which military men say is extremely probable, as they already had captured Sadagora, a few miles to the west. They are again in possession of Stanilau and have crossed the Lukwa River, the forward step which in the opinion of military experts will compel the Austrians to evacuate Bukovina. In Northern Poland the Russians are advancing slowly westward from the Niemen River and the Germans are fighting a rearguard action. Only at one point is the German attack being seriously pressed against the fortress of Osnowitz. Here the Germans can use their railway from Lyck, and there is a good road across the marshes, but with their armies falling back on either side they cannot remain long. British military experts say. To the south, according to a Berlin despatch, the Germans have evacuated Myszyniec, which is right on the East Prussian border, northwest of Lomza, while further west, near Miawa, they are believed actually to have crossed the border after their defeat at Przasnysz. The Russians also show revived activity in Central Poland and have attacked the Germans east of Plock and near Skierniewice, southwest of Warsaw. In the western theatre, the Anglo-French, like their Russian ally, are doing most of the attacking, but latterly without apparently making any further progress, although they claim to have repulsed German attacks which were delivered in an effort to regain lost ground. The sinking of the German submarine U 8 as officially announced to-day makes the fourth of these vessels to be sunk by British warships since the beginning of the war. There was no news last night of the naval operations in the Dardanelles.

DUTCH STEAMER REPORTED.

LONDON, To-day.
It is reported that the Dutch steamer Noodeyk, returning to Rotterdam with broken machinery after having sailed for the States, has been torpedoed in the English Channel.

SAILINGS HELD UP.

NEW YORK, To-day.
Exclusive of to-day's departures, no British or neutral ocean liners will sail from this port for Britain for eleven days for the first time in thirty years. According to available records a week will pass without sailings from England. Strikes at Liverpool and the action of the British Admiralty in pressing steamships into service as transports are responsible for this condition they declared.

PANIC AT CONSTANTINOPLE.

LONDON, To-day.
Consternation reigns at Constantinople. The Turks and Germans are realizing that they are powerless to prevent the allied fleet from forcing the passage of the Dardanelles and are hastily dismantling some forts in the Straits to obtain material for strengthening places on an island in the Sea of Marmora near the entrance of the Bosphorus, which is to be placed in a state of siege, according to a

AUSTRO-GERMANS MEET WITH SERIES OF REVERSES.

PETROGRAD, To-day.
Advices were received at Petrograd to the effect that the Austro-German forces have met with a series of reverses at the hands of the Russians, recently culminating in the reoccupation of Stanislaw. Serious battles are reported between the Mazelaboretz Pass in the Carpathians and the River San, where the Austrian advance is said to have been checked. In the vicinity of Salinka, midway of this line, two Austrian regiments are said to be wiped out by Russian machine guns. Austrian officers captured during the fighting say that their losses never had been heavier.

BULGARIA SECRETLY MOBILIZES.

PARIS, To-day.
Bulgaria has mobilized secretly three full army divisions in the neighborhood of Tirnova, according to information contained in a Salonika despatch, based upon what is said to be reliable authority. The same source is responsible for the statement that the Kostendil division has been sent to an unknown destination. An unnamed officer high in the Bulgarian army is quoted as saying "These troops would be useful in an advance on Adrianople."

PROGRESS IN THE DARDANELLES

PARIS, To-day.
The Dardanelles has now been cleared of mines as far as Chanak Kalesi, about a third of the distance through the Straits says a Tenedos despatch, dated March 6th. Mine workers are working under the protection of the allied warships, which are keeping up a steady bombardment of the forts on the European side.

LA TOURAINE ON FIRE.

LONDON, To-day.
The steamship LaTouraine is on fire in latitude 48°3 north, longitude 20°14 west, according to a wireless received here. Five steamers have gone to her assistance the message said.

Abundance of Good Food Thrown Away.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—Last season there were 250,000 seal-pelts brought into St. John's.

That means that there were 250,000 carcasses of fresh meat thrown away.

Fishermen say that the meat of the seal is as good as venison, and sometimes it is hard to tell the difference.

If these carcasses averaged 50 lbs. each twelve million, five hundred thousand pounds (12,500,000 lbs.) of fresh wholesome food was destroyed.

Suppose these figures exaggerated and cut them in half, then we are guilty of one of the greatest human crimes, destroying such lots of fresh wholesome food, when millions of poor people are crying for bread.

What a difference it would make in the homes of the poor in this country during the next year, if one million pounds of fresh meat were brought in before the 1st of April and distributed for a few cents a pound to those who needed it.

If there was once an excuse for such criminal waste, it has ceased now, when bread and meat are so dear, and when we hear so much of the poverty prevailing.

The whole conduct of this fishery is an anomaly and no other country in the world would be so supine, indifferent, ignorant, and destructive as we are.

There must be some way to solve the question and I commend it to those who assume all the responsibilities of running the country, and ask them to come down from their perch and consider it.

RECORD SALES.

Presiding at the annual general meeting, held in London, 10th February, 1915, the Earl of Erroll, K.T., C.B., in moving the adoption of the report, stated that though the past year had been a difficult one, Bovril had come through with flying colors, and they were able to show both record sales (apart altogether from Government orders) and largely increased profits. Cash at Bank and On Hand £42,349, and Trade Debtors £176,926. In conclusion, he stated that there was not a single German or alien enemy employed in their factories, either at home or abroad. The Report and Accounts were unanimously adopted.
