Two British
Steamers Sunk.

London, June 15. — Despatches to
Lloyd's report the sinking of the un-
armed British steamers Dewland and
Salmon Hole. The latter of 4,905
gross tons, sailed from Adelaide, on
March 19, and arrived at Las Palmas
May 11, but no reports of her move-
ments since then are obtainable. The
Dewland was a vessel of 1,993 tons,
which sailed on May 4 from Penarth
for destination not given in maritime
records.

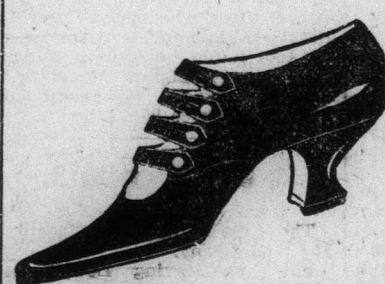
