### TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

**ANOTHER WIN.**  
COWES, Isle of Wight, Aug. 1.  
Great Britain today won the second  
year race for the British-American  
Cup in six metre class of yachts by 20  
points to 15. This with the first race  
last Friday at Ryde, puts the British  
yachts ahead of the Americans, 42  
points to 23.

**FOR RUSSIAN RELIEF.**  
WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 1.  
Secretary of Commerce Hoover, to-  
day called Walter Lyman Brown,  
European Director of the American  
Belt in London, to proceed to Riga  
and negotiate with Russian Soviet au-  
thorities preparatory to food relief  
work in Russia.

**PILED UP ON REEF.**  
SEATTLE, Aug. 1.  
The Puget Sound passenger steamer  
operated by the Pousoboth  
Company, crashed onto the inner reef  
at Port Ludlow, Washington, in a dense  
fog early today, and may be a total  
wreck, according to advices received  
here. The vessel carried a small num-  
ber of passengers, all of whom reached  
shore safely.

**EARTHQUAKE DOES DAMAGE.**  
LONDON, Aug. 1.  
A violent earthquake shock was felt  
at Leghorn, Italy, and elsewhere on  
Monday, says a despatch to the Lon-  
don Times from Milan. Several dan-  
gers were done in Lake Lugano district.  
The full extent of the damage done  
and the number of victims is not  
known. From the above despatch it  
would appear that the earthquake  
shock was felt over a distance of near-  
ly 200 miles from Leghorn Tyrrhenian,  
to Lake Lugano, just south of the  
Great Britain.

**EAGAN RELEASED.**  
DUBLIN, Aug. 1.  
John J. Egan, who has been incar-  
cerated in Limerick Jail, was liberated  
today, and has reached his home.  
Egan was under sentence of death, but  
last week the Minister of the Falls in  
Dublin Corps proceedings, ordered  
that the prisoner be brought into  
court. Failure to comply resulted in  
Egan's release. He was released  
under General Sir Nevill MacCreedy,  
Commander of British troops in  
Dublin. MacCreedy, Sir Edward  
Buckley, Commander in Chief,  
and the Governor of Limerick Jail, it  
was announced Saturday that the  
prisoner was released to release  
him from being on appeal  
from the Dublin Corps and contempt  
of Court order.

**PLUMOTH CELEBRATES LANDING  
OF FATHERS.**  
PLYMOUTH, AUG. 1.  
Plymouth Rock was rededicated by  
President Harding today, as a symbol  
of "Real human brotherhood" for all  
the world. Speaking at the terecent-  
ary celebration of the landing of the  
Pilgrims, the President declared his  
sincere hope that the principles of  
Liberty and Liberty, for which the  
Pilgrim Fathers crossed the Atlantic,  
might soon awaken a new world era,  
in which peace and understanding  
would be assured among the nations.  
He referred in particular to the effort  
toward disarmament, assuring the  
Pilgrims that the movement would  
succeed. With his tribute to the Pilgrims,  
President Harding enlivened the  
celebration by declaring that the  
achievements of the English speaking  
race everywhere, and declared he was  
convinced that the mission of the race  
would encompass even greater things  
than it had yet accomplished. "The

leadership of English speaking people  
in the present world crisis," he said,  
"could not be denied nor doubted by  
anyone." The President's address was  
delivered within a few hundred feet of  
the spot where Plymouth Rock had  
been enclosed in iron pillings to pre-  
serve it for posterity.

**VERY TACTFUL.**  
RICA, Aug. 1.  
While Russia is appealing for aid  
for her starving people from United  
States, the Executive Committee of  
the third international to-day sent  
out from Moscow by radio, an appeal  
to the world's proletariat to which it  
was charged "That the governments of  
England and America desire the Rus-  
sian workers classes to permit them to  
exchange a piece of bread for the op-  
portunity of organizing counter revolu-  
tions on Russian soil."

**NOT GOING BACK.**  
DUBLIN, Aug. 1.  
Eamonn De Valera, Irish leader, told  
newspapermen here that he had no in-  
tention of visiting London this week,  
and that no arrangements had been  
made for a future visit there. De Val-  
era made this statement in answer to  
questions by representatives of the  
press, as to reports that he was about  
to revisit British Capital.

**IRISH LABOR LEADER TALKS.**  
DUBLIN, Aug. 1.  
Thos. Foran, President of the Irish  
Labor party, addressing the annual  
congress of the party to-day at the  
Mansion House, declared that had  
labor the control the outcome of the  
present police negotiations would  
mean peace and freedom for Ireland,  
but, he added, if Irish negotiators  
deemed it advisable to turn down the  
British proposals, they would have the  
co-operation of the labor movement in  
any events that might follow.

**WORLD'S GREATEST TENOR.**

(Flash).—Enrico Caruso, died here  
to-day.
