Civil War Possible in Southern Ireland.

Ulster Border Lined With Armed Men—
Free Staters and Republicans in Open
Quarrel—Duality of Marine Losses.

IRELAND'S TROUBLES.
LONDON, March 20.
Sectarian warfare continues in Belfast and various parts of the six County Zone. Mills and farm-houses are being burned, bridges blown up, telegraph and telephone wires cut. The tension on the Ulster border increases where both Governments are increasing their forces. In Government circles here the proclamations of De Valera concerning the possibility of civil war in Southern Ireland cause anxiety.

LIKE A BATTLE FRONT.
LONDON, March 20.
The border line of Ulster is described as "like a battle front" by the Evening News Belfast correspondent, who says the Irish Republican army and Ulster special constables are actually within rifle range and continually firing at each other. The armies, continues the correspondent, are gradually creeping closer and the first collision is expected on the frontier near Caledon, County Tyrone.

DENIES SECRET AGREEMENT.
WASHINGTON, March 20.
Charges of an unwritten agreement between Britain and America to act together in any case arising out of the four power Pacific treaty brought a storm of debate in the Senate today. The charges were denied by Lodge and Underwood, both of whom were on the American delegation which drafted the treaty.

RECALLING U.S. TROOPS.
WASHINGTON, D.C., March 20.
All American troops on the Rhine are ordered home by July.

SCOTSBURN LOST—CREW SAFE.
ROCKLAND, Me., March 20.
Nine men of the crew of the Hal-

fax steamer Scotsburn, which sank yesterday off Cape Sable, were landed here to-day by the trawled Coot. The steamer registered 119 tons.

VALERIA'S CREW AT ST. JOHN.
ST. JOHN, N.B., March 20.
The crew of the Newfoundland schooner Valeria arrived here to-day on the Metegrans, enroute home. The Valeria sprang a leak on February 21st on the way from Cadix, Spain, for St. John's and the crew were rescued forty-eight hours later by the Portuguese schooner Fernando for Lisbon. They are: Captain, William W. Jensen; Mate, W. Perry; Cook, J. Short; T. Cox, A. Miller, seamen.

IRISH INSURGENTS CAPTURED.
BELFAST, March 20.
While De Valera's insurgent troops at Blaney were celebrating St. Patrick's Day elsewhere, the Irish Free State troops arrived and occupied their barracks. The insurgent troops then occupied Hope Arms Hotel. Yesterday the Free State Troops surrounded the hotel and captured De Valera's forces, it became known to-day.

MERGER APPROVED.
OTTAWA, March 20.
The Canadian Government has approved the Merger of the Bank of Montreal and Bank of Commerce.

STRIKE STILL ON.
ROME, March 20.
The Italian port workers' strike continues.

FRANCE WILL PAY.
PARIS, March 20.
France intends to pay her debt to the United States, Premier Poincare announced to-day.
