TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

STORM PARALYZES TRANSMIS-SION SERVICE.

NORTH SYDNEY, N.S., Dec. 31. North Cape Breton had to-day partially recovered from the damaging effect of the blizzard which swept over this district Saturday and cut off practically the whole island from telegraphic and telephonic communication with the mainland. Some 60 telephone poles were blown down as were some of the high tension power transmission lines controlling the electric lights, and electrical service in all branches was generally damaged, and in some instances put entirely out of commission. It will be a week before all repairs will have been effected. No marine disasters were reported.

U.S.A. TO SUPPLY FEDERALS WITH WAR EQUIPMENT.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31. The United States Government has decided to sell a quantity of war equipment to the Obregon Government of Mexico, now at grips with the Huerta Revolutionists. This procedure is announced by the Cabinet which stated that it was adopted in the interests of peace in the neighboring Republic and in accordance with relations between the two governments formally recognized last September

FLOODS THREATENED IN FRANCE

PARIS, Dec. 31, The rivers of France are at flooding, causing great suffering to the people and damage to property following months of almost continued rain. The flood has come earlier than usual and threatens to assume the aspects of a disaster. Already the quays in Paris and the suburbs are under water and householders along the Seine are taking hasty depar-

STORM DESTROYS MINES IN THE BLACK SEA.

MOSCOW, Dec. 31. Dispatches received from Odessa to-day say that a storm on the Black Sea, which has been raging since December 24th, is still in progress. Captains of vessels report that large numbers of mines are floating about making navigation dangerous. Advices say that the United States steamer Conejos struck a floating mine thus explaining her loss previously reported with all on board, Bodies are being washed ashore indicate other disasters.
