The High Price of Milk

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—Householders are wondering why they should be compelled to pay the apparently exorbitant price of 80 cents per gallon for milk? About four years ago this question was the subject of considerable discussion and comment. The Farmer's Union took the matter up, and made a reduction based on conditions existing at that time. Since then, however, there has been a considerable reduction in the price of milk as used by the farmers, but a corresponding reduction in the price of milk has not been forthcoming.

The following review of prices existing in 1920 and 1924 and the large percentage of decrease noted, need no comment. Before taking this matter up further, householders would like to have an explanation from the Farmer's Union, through the columns of The Evening Telegram.

Spain's Thorn in Morocco

"With the approach of spring the recrudescence of trouble in the Riff was not anticipated by students of affairs in Barbary since Abd-el-Krim assumed direction, some three years ago, of the resistance of the Riff highlanders to the Spaniards," writes Lieut.-Colonel C. P. Hawkes in the Daily Mail.

"Last year, on the approach of winter, the fighting season ended with operations in the district west of Mellilla, in which, despite the strictness of the Spanish censorship, it was evident that the Spanish troops had narrowly escaped another disaster. They retired, however, to the shelter of the Presidios, and Abd-el-Krim led his clansmen back into their hills to prepare through the winter for a fresh forward movement in the spring.

"Still in the vigorous thirties, the Riff chieftain is practically master of the situation in the north-western portion of the Spanish zone, the other areas of which have been reduced to comparative tranquillity.

"Since his amazing exploits in 1921 when this obscure deserter from the Spanish administrative service at Ceuta led a handful of Berber mountaineers to victory against a European army of some 15,000 men equipped with all the latest appliances of modern warfare, Abd-el-Krim has acquired a prestige among the Muslims of North Africa unequalled since the days of Abd-el-Kader.

"Raisuli, in his forays against the French, employed merely the tactics of a chieftain, though possessed of a romantic personality and an alleged Shagreened descent. With no such advantages, Abd-el-Krim (whose name means 'Servant of God, the Generous') has won success by different methods.

"The chosen avenger of 400,000 people who, in the immortal history of their indomitable race, have never before submitted themselves to one man's leadership, his recruits are obeyed and his taxes paid ungrudgingly; though he has, like a Barber-Cromwell, disavowed the bid
