Forty-Five Years in the Service of the Public-The Evening Telegram.

After Fifty-One Years ONE OF THE PIONEER OPERAT. ORS VISITS NEWFOUNDLAND.

(H. F. SHORTIS.) To-morrow will be the fifty-eighth anniversary of the successful laying of the Atlantic Telegraph Cable, which occurred on the 27th July, 1866. All the first contingent of the cable perators who took up their duties in Heart's Content, at that date, have bassed from amongst us to the Great Beyond. In fact I know of no person who was connected with the teleraph employ in that memorable and istoric year except Mr. William Savin, of Hoylestown, for some years refired. But there remain a few of the old New York, Newfoundland and London operators of the old land lines still in the flesh, and amongst them Mr. Peter H. Glendinning, formerly of Mount Pearl, St. John's West, brother of Mr. Andrew Glendinning.

the well known farmer. Mr. Glendinning had a most interesting life since he left Newfoundland, and indeed, if fully written up. would read like a romance. In his early days he worked on his father's farm (the same place that Andrew has to-day), and one stormy day the popular Superintendent of the Company, A. M. MacKay, with Mr. George Elmsely, were driving round Conception Bay on business, when opposite Hendinning's farm house, the horse and sleigh (like Uncle Joe Drover, so famed in song) got "bogged in the snow" Peter Glendinning hurried their assistance, and with other help, managed to clear away the snow and extricate the horse and sleigh. The Hon. Mr. MacKay asked Peter if he intended to remain a farmer, and Peter replied in the negative. "Wetl," said the good old Superintendent, "If you wish you can come down to the relegraph Office, and I'll give you a chance to learn telegraphy." The Telerraph Office was then in the old Court louse, on Water Street, St. John's. Peter commenced to master the dots and dashes. After a year in the St. John's office he was transferred to Hr. Grace and had for his associates R. H. Parsons, E. F. Howell, A. A. Thompson, James G. Scanlin, E, B. Thempson, James P. Thomey and myself. He remained in Hr. Grace for about three years, when he received orders to go to Grandy's Brook on the old West Line. After a short time that office was closed, owing to the cable being laid between Placentia and Sydney. He left Newfoundland and brought up at St. Peter's, Cape Breton, and having the highest recommendation from Mr. MacKay, he had no difficulty in procuring employ ment. He remained there three years, and then moved to New Glasgow. Nova Scotia, where he became Manager of the Western Union Telegraph Office, General Ticket Agent for the Lower Provinces of the Grand Trunk Railway, Agent for the Intercolonial Express Co., Transmission Agent for Freight and Express for Eastern Nova Scotia, and remained there six years, starting for Sulphur Springs, Missouri, U.S.A. entering the service of the Missouri Pacific Railway Company, as Agent and Telegraph Operator, as well as Agent for the St. Louis Ore and Steel Company. He was promoted after 17 years service to the station of Bismarck in the same State. After a time he returned to Sulphur Springs, and after two years went to Kimmiswick, two miles north. He was next appointed Agent and Telegrapher at Mineral Point, about 40 miles distant, where he remained one year, and thence he went to Silica. After a short time he removed to Monticello, Arkansas, and the next move he brought up at Standard, Louisiana. He went back to Victoria, Missouri, and thence to Bevely, in the same State; and there he (to use a nautical phrase) "dropped his anchor." and has had no cause to regret it.
