Premier King Denies Having Tendered His Resignation

Conservatives Fail to Secure Majority in
Canadian Elections--American Professor
Predicts an Earthquake in New England.

Definite election returns at eight
o'clock to-night, with eight seats
doubtful, gave the Conservatives 117
seats; Liberals, 97; Progressives, 20;
Labor, 2; Independent, 1. The doubt-
ful seats were Queen's, P.E.I., where
the vote was tied; Wetaskiwan and
Peace River, in Alberta; Kindersley,
East Mountain, Maple Creek, Rose-
burn and Qu'Appelle, in Saskatchewan.

KING HAS NOT DECIDED TO RESIGN.

cided to place his resignation in the
hands of the Governor General which

Canadian Press, "I intend to discuss
the situation with the Governor Gen-
eral and I shall then make a state-
ment of my intentions."

LEAGUE'S TASK ACCOMPLISHED.

day last to prevent threatened hos-
tilities between Greece and Bulgaria,
adjourned to-day with its task ac-
complished.

MANNER.

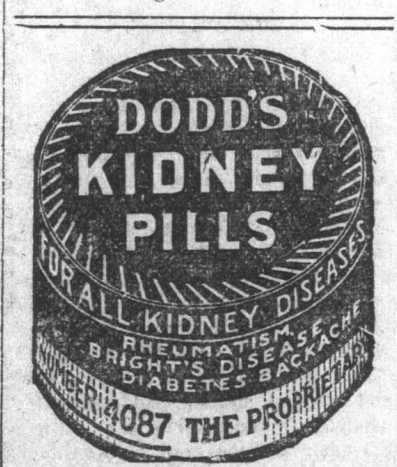
"Dante's Inferno" is the title of the
