Proposed 2½ p.c. Surtax.

The proposals put forward by the American delegation included the fol-

The Powers shall authorize the levying of a surtax of 21/2 p.c. on all goods from February 1, 1926, and a chedule of luxuries shall be prepared on which a tax of 5 per cent. shall be effective not later than July 1, 1926.

Provisions shall be made for the levying of the full amount of these surtaxes at the land frontiers, and a new treaty drawn up which shall provide that three months after the treaty is concluded the Chinese Government, until tariff autonomy has ecome effective, shall be at liberty to mpose a new, uniformly enforced schedule of duties at rates from 5 to 121/2 per cent. on imports and 5 to 1/2 per cent. on exports.

Likin (provincial transit duty) and related internal taxes shall abolished.

Subject to the fulfilment of the provisions, the present treaty restrictions shall cease and a national tariff shall come into force on January 1 1929. 
