Fatal Orange Riot in Scotland.

The celebration of the 12th of July in Scotland has unhappily been attended with fatal and serious consequences. Two lodges of Orangemen returning from a demonstration in the district of Wishaw on Friday evening, were attacked by a number of Catholics, and a serious riot took place. Pick shafts and staves were employed by the assailants, and some women threw stones and other missiles. Two of the Orangemen had their heads opened by blows dealt with shafts, and three were severely injured. The riot was quelled in less than half an hour. Three Catholics, named McGinlay, Hughes and Ferns, all miners, were apprehended for assault, a collier named McGuire, for molesting the police, and a woman named Fechan, for throwing stones. The prisoners were brought before the magistrates at the Wishaw borough police court on Saturday. The three men charged with assault, were bound over to keep the peace for six months, McGuire was fined £2, and the woman £1. About three hours after the riot and when the town seemed perfectly quiet the police received information that one of the leading members of the Orange party in Wishaw had been brutally assaulted in a back street. The man, who was a collier, named Skellion, was found lying by the roadside, insensible, and seemed to have been dreadfully kicked and struck about the head, and only survived a little over an hour. The police, after a long search, came upon the three men concealed behind a hedge, outside the town, whom they apprehended on a charge of having caused the death of Skellion.
