New Coiffures

How many times a week do you hear, "Oh, my hair is dreadful! I simply can't do anything with it!" And how many times do you feel that you could do something with that girl's hair, if only you could show her how to fix it.

For the trouble is rarely with the hair, but with the way it is dressed. And there are so many ways of doing the hair, that some one method will be becoming to this hard-to-stay type.

Oily hair is impossible to fix—but oily hair can be washed often enough to keep it fine and fluffy. That limp, wisp-mouse-colored hair is discouraging to own—but, if it's thick, it can be parted, combed softly back and wound in a coronet braid around the head. And if it's short, it can be brushed smoothly off the face, with a little perfum to hide the ears and to soften the line of the cheek. Then it can be rolled under and pinned, forming a roll that follows the line of the head from the back of the neck to the middle of the top of the head itself. And hair nets cover a multitude of wigs!

The new coiffures are much softer than those of the past season, a fact that the very thin-faced and very plump-faced woman should rejoice to hear. New styles allow the hair to be pulled quite far down the cheeks, to hide hollows, and fairly far down on the forehead. The severity of the late styles was trying to all but the most beautiful faces, while the fussiness of the styles before that, made the woman look as though she were peeping from a thick underbrush. The most beautiful styles are always the simplest ones.

Y.W.C.A. ISSUES A NEW FALL AND WINTER PROSPECTUS

Evening Classes and Social Work Will Appeal to Almost Everyone

A splendid course of studies is being furnished by the Y.W.C.A. this season and the prospectus just issued augurs well for the success of the course. The departments provided for include the religious work, Mrs. C. M. Staines, convener, with Miss Moulton, Miss Cox and Miss Carrick also teaching; meeting Sundays at 4.30. Tuesdays and Thursdays at 7 p.m. and Fridays at 6.30. The physical culture department has issued a separate circular for its various branches of gymnasium, swimming, basketball and playground training work. Mrs. Haroon Riley is convener for this and Miss Gladys Meredith instructor. A glee club, Mrs. C. A. Stuart, director, will study the best song literature and will meet Mondays at 8 p.m.; expression and dramatic art will be taught by Miss Teresa M. Seigel on Mondays, with a special course for the sons for \$2.50. Miss Seigel is a graduate of the Chaffee-Noble school of expression of Detroit, Mich.

A special course for business women has been arranged in business English and will be given Thursdays at 8 p.m. with 10 lessons for \$1.50. Military will be taught by Mrs. Gordon-Cooper on Tuesdays at 8 p.m. (five lessons for \$2.00) and will include making, trimming, etc., of hats.

Manicuring and hairdressing is a new department under the direction of Mrs. Arthur and will include care of face, hands and hair. These classes open November 1st on Thursday at 8 p.m. and five lessons will be held.

Sewing and dressmaking will be taught on Fridays at 8 p.m. (ten lessons for \$1.50) under the able direction of Mrs. H. E. Fish. This will include, in addition to sewing, knitting, crocheting and tatting. Cooking will also be taught by Miss Wilmer, a graduate of Macdonald Institute, with five lessons including the following course: October 22, candy; November 5, the invalid's tray; November 19, salads; December 3, afternoon tea; December 17, ice. The five lessons will be given for \$1.00 or 25 cents each. A. H. Johnson, a graduate of Macdonald Institute, is convener. Social work classes are given on Tuesdays at 8 p.m.

Junior Girls
In the Junior girls department (High School Girls' club) in addition to the physical culture special program for Friday afternoons has been arranged as follows: 4.30, swimming; 5.30, club supper; 6.30, Bible class; 7.30, Red Cross work.

CANADIAN SOLDIERS IN TRENCHES ASK FOR MAPLE SUGAR

Alberta C. W. C. A. Has Already Ordered Ton and a Half—More Is Wanted

The Canadian War Contingent association has received an urgent request, called by Mr. J. G. Colmer, honorary secretary, London, England, for maple sugar for men in the trenches. As is well known, there is a shortage of sugar in England, and candy of all kinds has become very expensive. Maple sugar sent direct from Canada will help to remind our boys that the friends at home are thinking of them. In addition to this, maple sugar is an excellent food. Sugar is one of our best heat-producing foods, and on that account is needed in larger quantities at this season of the year.

The executive at Toronto has decided that it will order maple sugar by the ton, put up in half pound boxes, as this is found to be by far the best way of supplying it. The Alberta provincial branch has ordered one and a half tons of maple sugar at \$550 per ton. This is already paid for, but it is desired to purchase more, if possible. Subscriptions for this purpose may be sent to Mrs. P. S. Woodhall, treasurer, or to Mrs. Norman Hindley, secretary, at the Red Cross depot, Rex theater building, Calgary. Any person or association giving one ton may have a special label placed on each half-pound box, giving the name of the donor.

FINAL PLANS ARE MADE FOR BRITISH RED CROSS DAY

Tag-Day Appeal Tomorrow for Society by Local Red Cross

The headquarters for "tag day" tomorrow, will be at Central Methodist church. Taggers who are looking after the house to house campaign in the outlying districts, may get their boxes at the Red Cross depot today and tomorrow.

The Red Cross society requires the assistance of the British Red Cross tag day tomorrow. The appeal is extremely urgent. The British Red Cross society is expending \$20 a minute in keeping up its various units in different theaters of the war. It is estimated that \$45,000 a day is required to meet the needs of the society. The Calgary Red Cross hopes that this appeal will be widely and generously answered. It is necessary that our organization on tag day should be very complete if we are to achieve the best results. All women who will give their services to tag, are requested to register their names at the Red Cross depot immediately. This is not intended to interfere with those Red Cross groups which have made themselves responsible for the outlying districts of the city. Taggers are needed for the center of Calgary.
