## MOSA COUNCIL.

The Council met in the Town Hall, Glencoe, on Saturday the 13th inst. Present: B. Waterworth, Reeve; A. Campbell Deputy Reeve; S. Gibb, M. Walker and T. Simpson.

The minutes of last meeting were read and signed.  
Cheques for the payment of the following sums were ordered to be issued, viz.:—Trustees S. S. No. 2, \$2 for use of school house at nomination, and for \$2.88, balance of rates collected for 1880; Trustees S. S. No. 5, \$4.36, balance of rates collected in 1879 & 1880; Trustees S. S. No. 1, \$4.41 for balance of rates collected in 1880; George Cline, \$2.66, for sheep killed by dogs; Treasurer of Euphemia, \$50.84, instalments, due by Moa, of expense of deepening Hagarty Creek for 1879 and 1880; William Weekes, \$14.50 for 29 cords of gravel for roads in Ward No. 2; Alex. Cameron, \$5 for 10 cords of gravel for Ward No. 2; Ira Gilbert, \$11, for 22 cords of gravel for Ward No. 2; Daniel Thomas, \$6, for 12 cords of gravel for Ward No. 2; Benj. Samson, \$1.25, for 24 cords of gravel; James Waterworth, fifty cents, for spikes used in repairing a culvert on Bend road; James Gillispie, \$1.68, for plank and spikes for repairing culvert on Town-line.

Communications:—From Thos. Hatold, complaining that W. Sheppard had placed his fence on the road between 1st and 2nd ranges north, opposite Lot No. 17, and requesting the Council to take measures to remove the obstruction; from County Clerk, as to amount of County rates; from George Oliver and others, petitioning to have the Harper Drain cleaned out from its outlet to the east side of lot 26, 1st con.; from Trustees of S. S. Nos. 1, 2, 3, 7 and 8, applying for school rates.

Moved by Simpson, seconded by Walker, that the matter complained of by Thos. Hatold, be referred to Mr. Gibb, to make enquiries and report at next meeting of Council. Carried.  
Moved by Gibb, seconded by Campbell, that the Clerk be instructed to place on the Collector's Roll, the amounts applied for by the Trustees of the various sections in this township, being the amount of rates for 1881. Carried.

Moved by Campbell, seconded by Simpson, that the prayer of the petition of George Oliver and others be granted, and that S. Gibb be a Commissioner to let and superintend the work. Carried.  
Moved by Campbell, seconded by Gibb, that the Clerk be instructed to place on the Collector's Roll, against the names of persons assessed for Gov. Drain No. 1, the pro rata portion of the expense of cleaning out said drain, amounting in the aggregate to \$115.81. Carried.

Moved by Gibb, seconded by Walker, that Jas. Stinson, sr., be allowed three days' statute labor, for keeping open a ditch running through his lot. Carried.  
By-Law No. 183, for preventing the spread of mustard, milkweed and rapiers bugles, commonly known as "blue weed" was read the usual number of times and finally passed, on motion of Campbell, seconded by Walker.

By-Law No. 184 (to permit the removal of gravel from the river Thames for the repair and construction of public highways) was read the 1st, 2nd and 3rd time, and, on motion of Campbell, seconded by Gibb, finally passed.

The Council adjourned to meet at Glencoe on the first Saturday (the 1st day) of October next.

The death rate in New York for the first seven months in the year is largely in excess of that of the same period of 1880. It might have been supposed that this unfavorable exhibit was owing to the severity of the winter weather, but the truth is that the increase of mortality arises from a notable development of what are known as zymotic diseases. Diphtheria, typhus, typhoid and small-pox are largely in excess, while that great destroyer of infant lives scarlet fever, has increased five fold. All this means defective ventilation, overcrowding in their "tenements," the presence of sewer gas in the houses, and in general terms, dirt in some form or other. In many instances badly trapped drain pipes cause more deaths per annum than an invading army would occasion.

London, Aug. 15.—The Duke of Argyll, who was married recently to the daughter of the Bishop of Albans, is denounced by the Radical press as the instigator of the obstructive policy of the Lords on the Land Bill. It is said that the Duke is so incensed against the Government that he has written the Marquis of Lorne recommending him to resign the Governor-Generalship of Canada, so that the house of Argyll may not be beheld in any respect to the Ministry of the day. Should the conference of the two Houses fail, Mr. Gladstone will call an autumn session, introducing a still stronger and more sweeping Bill. Some of his friends go so far as to say that if no arrangement can be reached next week the Premier will at once dissolve Parliament, and appeal to the country.

Chicago, Aug. 12.—Senator John R. Tanner, who has just returned from an extended trip through Southern Illinois, and is thoroughly familiar with the condition of the crops says that the effects of the long-continued drought cannot be estimated. Not a drop of rain has fallen in that part of the State since June 30, and all vegetation is completely withered and dried up from the effects of the hot air that has been sweeping over the country for the past three weeks. It is a matter of great surprise to hear that the truth has never been told concerning the condition of affairs in the southern part of the State. There are many fine farms of 200 acres and over from which not a dollar will be realized this year, and it is doubtful if any amount of rain now will save crops. The condition of affairs is altogether unprecedented. The crops heretofore, especially in the southern part of the State, have never failed. For that reason farmers have fed all surplus corn to stock, and depended on this year's crops for subsistence. The actual fact is that generally throughout southern Illinois the corn yield will not exceed five bushels per acre, while other crops and fruits have suffered in the same proportion. The Senator gives it as his candid opinion that the majority of farmers will be obliged to sell their live stock at the best prices they can get, or drive it out of stall, since they cannot feed it. Even now pastures are as dry and barren as they would be in December, and all small streams have failed.

Winnipeg, Aug. 10.—Land Commissioner McTavish, of the Syndicate, has opened the Canada Pacific Railway Land Office in the Montreal Bank building. Parties who have squatted on and are in actual possession of old sections within the railway belt, twenty-four miles on each side of the main and branch lines as they are located, are requested to send immediately to the office full particulars of the same, stating the date of the first occupation, the nature of their improvements, the number of acres of land broken up or under crop, and any other information which will assist in awarding the land to bona fide settlers without dispute. No preference will be shown to parties who may squat on lands open for sale after this day. The Company will be prepared in the course of a week or ten days to sell lands for the purpose of cultivation at their highest public rates, \$2.50 per acre, with a rebate of 50 per cent. (\$1.25) under certain conditions, which will be made public. Applications will have consideration according to priority of receipt. The Company will reserve for the present all sections immediately on the main line or branches, as well as sections in the vicinity of laid out towns or possible junctions, and any lands that may be required for railway purposes, as well as mineral, wood and coal lands, and sections with water-power thereon.

A BRIDEGROOM MURDERED.—Ottawa, Aug. 11.—For some time past James Wetherell, aged 70 years, a widower, and Margaret Dougherty, a widow aged 50, had been keeping company with each other, as well as the intimacy being a matrimonial union, which was legalized last night at the residence of a Mrs. Cooper, where the widow had been visiting, by the Rev. Mr. White, Presbyterian minister at Rochesterville. When it was ascertained that the nuptial knot had been tied, the small boys of the place gathered together, and armed with pots, pans, horns, &c., calculated to produce discordant sounds, began to demonstrate. They kept up a perfect pandemonium for several hours, after which the leader confronted the aged bridegroom and demanded \$1. He complied, and after being treated the crowd dispersed at about 9.45. Everything remained quiet for a while, and the happy couple congratulated themselves on being let off so easily. About 10.30, however, a number of grown up roughs, hearing of the success of the boys, made a demand for \$2. This was refused, and the charivari began in real earnest again, lasting until 2 o'clock this morning, during which time stones were freely thrown. At 2.10 o'clock, the bride says, two men broke in the door and demanded \$2. Her husband told them to leave instantly or he would strike them with a stick which he had in his hand. They laughed at him and said they were bound to "hold the fort" until the money was forthcoming. At this Wetherell raised the stick and struck one of them over the shoulders. They both left, and the old man followed again. Nothing more was seen of him until this morning, when his lifeless form was picked up a short distance from Mrs. Cooper's house on another street.

The four parties arrested for the murder of James Wetherell at Mount Sherwood, near Ottawa, on his wedding night, are again as follows:—James O'Shaughnessy, 22; James Kelly, 19; R. Bert McLaren, 18; Christopher Barry, 15. They are all native Canadians of Irish descent.

The British House of Lords will not be content to simply register the Commons in regard to the Irish Land Bill. Already three amendments have been adopted by heavy majorities. One of these amendments limits compensation for disturbance to £250. Another amendment seems to enlarge the discretion of the land court in regard to allowing landlords to take away holdings or parts of holdings. A third amendment gives the landlord a right to compensation in case of the sale of a holding of which he has previously bought up the tenant right.

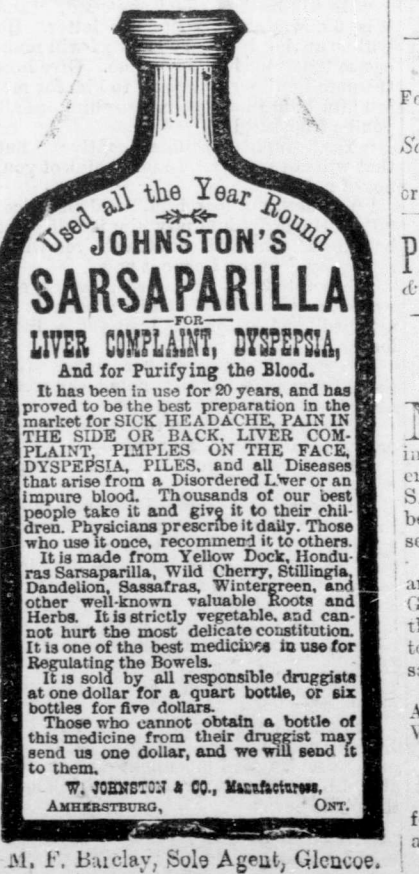
