Atina's Eruption Increasing.

Special Correspondents Warned Away from Wallace, Idaho.

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Late Canadian News

Smallpox in Victoria, B. C.—Help for the Owners of St. John's, Nfld.—Ninety Days' Quarantine Against Imported Cattle.

Two cases of smallpox are reported at Calgary and one at Macleod.

Lord Mount Stephen has cabled \$500 to the relief fund for St. John's.

Almost \$30,000 has been subscribed at Montreal for the St. John's fire sufferers.

Hamilton will consolidate its city debt and borrow \$2,000,000 on 30-year debentures.

The M. C. R. employees picketed at St. Thomas on Friday, five trains taking the excursionists to that city.

Manitoba's immigration agent in England cables that over 300 agriculturists have just left for that Province.

Hugh McPherson, farmer, Grenfell, Man., was killed by lightning while standing at his own door on Thursday.

A cable dispatch announces that the argument in the Manitoba school case before England's Privy Council has been finished and judgment reserved.

The Canadian quarantine against imported cattle has been made 90 days, and that on sheep and swine increased from 15 to 60 days.

The action is taken as a result of foot and mouth disease being prevalent among cattle in England.

The Provincial Secretary of British Columbia has telegraphed to the Provincial Board of Health at Montreal to the effect that there are 48 cases of smallpox in Victoria, 5 in Vancouver and 1 in New Westminster; none elsewhere so far as known.

The Montreal Street Railway Company will begin to run electric cars on Wednesday, and it is expected an injunction will be taken out to prevent them under any circumstances.

At Hamilton on Friday Howard Baine, aged 4, son of Mr. Thomas J. Baine, of the Bell Organ Company, while playing with matches in the woodshed in rear and set fire to a pile of light kindling wood, and was only saved from being burned to death by the heroic efforts of his mother, who rushed into the burning building and rescued the little one.

THE FIRE RECORD.

DUPLOU, N. Y., July 15.—George B. Hays' handsome new house at the corner of Elmwood and North streets, was gutted by fire early this morning. The house was worth \$50,000; damage, \$25,000; fully insured. Mr. Hays was slightly burned.

FREEDOM OF OPINION.

The papers are still discussing the dismissal by Sir Oliver Mowat of Egin Myers, county attorney of Inverness, because he advocated the political union of Canada with the United States. It is a matter on which the dismissed is defended in that Mr. Myers was an official of the Government, and that the Government might in some way be supposed to be responsible for his views. This is the only point which it can be defended, as the right of free speech is too well understood in this country to be called in question now. It is said that as Mr. Myers took the oath of allegiance to the Queen when he was appointed to his office, he was, in advancing his views, doing something highly improper. But if Mr. Myers can take the oath of allegiance to the Queen, he can also take the oath of allegiance to the United States, and while the Government does not advocate annexation it does not see why the same rule of liberty should not apply to a county attorney or any other official. Canada is a democracy because they vote Liberal than it is to have a county attorney expressing his honest opinion as to what he sincerely believes to be for the good of his country. It is a matter of this kind, where the right of free speech is involved, it is better to err on the side of freedom than to err on the side of intolerance and the gag. Those who are honest in their opinion that annexation would be best thing that could happen Canada should have precisely the same latitude of expression as those who believe in imperial federation, independence, or any other theory regarding our country's future.
