Mr. M. C. Cameron was loudly called for and took the platform amidst loud and prolonged applause. He was pleased so see that the old spirit still animated his friends in Huron, that spirit which had been so successful in so many hotly contested elections on his behalf in the past. Of this amount the cheese sent to Great Britain was valued at \$179,173 and the bacon at \$115,571. The imports for the same period were \$118,906, on which a duty of \$23,822.69 was collected. The total pounds of cheese here represented was 1,833,769 and the total pounds of bacon 1,155,712.


