WAYSIDE ADVERTISING.

In the East It is Looked Upon as

Nusiance. The custom of advertising by the way. side has got to be such a nuisance that something should be done to stop it. It is carried to such an extent in many localities, and it so disfigures landscapes otherwise beautiful, that a large number of travelers would prefer to pass through such places by night rather than be subject to the continual irritation caused by such offenses to the eye. The trouble is, however, that the nusiance is becoming so universal that one would have to travel everywhere by night to avoid it. One of the latest atrocities is that of making signboards into the shape of huge bottles, and other articles, covered with inscriptions setting forth the virtues of some quack nostrum or other. A praisworthy attempt was made in the lastilegislature to prohibit or diminish this evil; but somehow it failed, probably bethose who voted with a cord of cause legislators could not see why a man should not have the right to permit his barn, shed or house to be covered with advertising signs, or his meadow or field, topasses on the highway or in the railway cars. Possibly the evil might be reached and very severely discouraged by a system of taxation at a rate increasing with the size of the lettering or dimensions of space occupied. This would certainly be a legit-imate subject for taxation. The person owning the property should be made responsible for the tax, for it might be impossible to reach the parties doing the advertising. The proprietor of the premises would thus he made shy of leasing such advertising

LONDONERS OUT WEST.

How They Rough It in Alberta Territory.

Experiences of Former Residents o This City and Middlesex-Laughable and Otherwise.

Writing from Waghern, Alberta, N. W. T., to Mr. John Connor, old book store, city, Mr Cecil Clunes Ewing, a former Londoner, says: "I like this country first-rate. We have beautiful hills, stretching to the Rockies, which are visible on fine days, though 150 miles off. The fields are covered with lilles of the valley, wild roses, pea vines and violets, and early in the season were nearly white with wild straw berry blossoms. Everything grows fast here. I have shot many rabbits. There are also wild duck, but they fly fast and are hard to get at. I am getting my shanty or "shack" put up. I cut all the top for it myself. Cooper's house is one of the biggest up here. Paisley seems to be getting along well. It is very comical to see Mr. Paisley and his company driving out in their buckboard with an ox instead of a pony. I said driving, but there is more spurting than anything else. It is a good thing Mr. Paisley doesn't swear, else the air would be blue. Mrs. Paisley has a look of calm resignation on her face when the ox takes it into his head to turn off the trail to go and feed near bushes or rushes down a steep ditch to get a drink. Mrs. Paisley seems to like the country now very much, though at first she did not. Potatoes are 90 cents a bushel, flour \$2 50 (the best) Mr. Cooper paid 15 cents for a bottle of ink but I think must have been cheated, as I got mine for 10 cents. Brumpton, who used to have a store on Dundas street, has a store here. He seems to have made a lot

of money. Red Deer has about seven stores, two doctors and a mounted police station. It has two hotels. There are a lot of coyotes up here. You can hear them howling at night. They will not touch people. A brown bear was seen about 100 yaras from the house the other day, but no one was at home. I am getting an Indian pony to run around on. I have been down fishing in Red Deer River. There is good fishing and the fish weigh from about three-quarters of a pound to a pound. I do not expect to do a great deal this year. It is a little lonely, but you must expect that in a newly settled country. I saw a lot of Indians on the Edmonton trail. They had their hair braided and decorated with silver ornaments and feathers. They just camp wherever they please. They take pack horses with them to carry the tents and provisions. Droves of horses from 25 to 100 travel through the country attended by cowboys. I saw 700 sheep the other day. I went to Lacombe picnic on July 2. Lacombe has three or

four stores and a hotel. The people there are mostly English. We had a very fine day. We had to sit down to tables as there is no bush nearer than a mile and a half. They had poles covered with spruce branches which made it nice and cool. There were about 100 Indians and about the same number of halfbreeds. The Indians rode ponies in two or three races and one pony tried to run up on to a slanting roof and pitched the rider off. After that they had a foot race for the squaws. also pole jumping, high jumping and tug-ofwar. There must have been nearly 1,000 persons there-a very orderly crowd, no drinking at all. I expect that was because the hotel has no license vet. There were some wonderful costumes there among the Indians. One had a fur hat, a soldier's coat and blue overall pants. Some had no pants at all, but their legs are so brown you could hardly tell the difference. Each one in the pony race was armed with some kind of a club. One had a walkingstick with a hook on the end; another a stick

about three feet long and a foot thick, the rest had whips. The days here are very long-sun sets at . p.m. instead of 8 p.m. as in Ontario. I can see to read at 10 p.m. on clear nights. John Perkins, son of the butcher on Dundas street, is up here boarding with Mr. Paisley. He is getting stronger I think. The land is being taken up here rapidly. We've had about three frests but they have not damaged the potatoes much.

APPLES BETTER THAN WHEAT.

Oregon Steadily Rolling Up Wealth With Fruit, Especially Apples. That it will not do to put all of one's eggs in one basket has been thoroughly demonstrated by the berry crop this season. With thousands of crates ripe, the ability to reach a market is, without any fault of ours, suddenly taken away. The strawberry crop has been the principal one of this section: and while it will not only hold its present yield, but will double and treble it, it will in a year or two become of secondary importance. Prunes, peaches, cherries and fruit grower because they furnish him with money early in the season, as well as early in his business. They are a means to an and to improve the farms. They all bear one fatal objection as a crop to be relied upon, and that is the absolute necessity of

year 70 times as much, and then for twenty | nati Inquirer. years 100 times as much. In other words, one acre of winter apples is worth more, year in and year out, than 100 acres of wheat. Six acres of good orchard will yield a larger net yield than a section of wheat land. Multiply the acres in Hood River valley by 100, and some idea of the wealth that it will eventually produce may be gained.

In other words, every section in fruit will produce a cash value equal to three townships of wheat. The winter apple is going to accomplish this result. And the next few years, as the young orchards come into bearing, will prove the truth of this assertion, though it now seems a wild one. We can but reiterate our former words: "Plant apple trees-twenty acres if you can; one tree if that is your limit, but plant at every opportunity." When this valley is an orchard from the mills to the summit east of us, and from the river back for twenty miles, then only will it have attained its full development .- [Hood River

The U. S. Senate Insists on a Forty-Cent Coal Tax.

Only Six Votes Cast for Hill's Motion to Make It Free-Senator Vilas' Elcquent Defense of President

WASHINGTON, July 26 .- At 12 o'clock today the Senate took up the question of agreeing to a further conference on the tariff bill. Mr. Vilas (Dem., Wis.) addressed the Senate in a two-hours' speech, delivered off hand and with much oratorical effect. His speech was highly eulogistic of President Cleveland, whom he defended from the charges of duplicity and of improper interference with legislation made by Senator Gorman in his speech of Monday. He spoke of Mr. Cleveland as "the great first citizen of the republic," and as the "representative of national honor," and he declared, with solemnity and vehemence, that to assail Grover Cleveland was to strike at the republic; that to insult him was to affront every good citizen; and that to stab him was to sting the heart of every true American. In conclusion he withdrew his motion of Friday to strike out the discriminating duty of one-eighth of 1 cent a pound on sugar, and favored Mr. Gray's motion to insist and to consent to further conference. He did this, he said, because he was a strict party man and desired to be in accord with his Democratic brethren, and he expressed the hope that out of this conference would come a measure far better than that which had already passed

the Senate. Mr. Vilas was followed by Mr. Stewart Populist, Nevada), who criticised the President's letter as an invasion of executive power such as had cost Charles I. his

head. At the close of the debate the vote was taken on Mr. Hill's motion to recede from the duty of 40 cents a ton on iron ore and on coal. There were only six votes, including his own, cast in favor of it, as against

65 in the negative. Then Mr. Caffery (Democrat, Louisiana) withdrew his motion in favor of a modified sugar bounty for 1894. Mr. Quay had already withdrawn his motion to have sugar put on the free list, and the only question left was Mr. Gray's motion to insist and to agree to the further confer-

ence asked by the House. As the vote was about to be taken, Mr. Vilas' motion to recede from the 1/8 cent a pound discriminating duty on sugar was renewed by Mr. Washburn (Republican, Minnesota). A point of order was made against it, and that point was debated without a conclusion being reached until 5:45, when the Senate adjourned.

BRUTAL BROCKWAY.

ELMIRA, N. Y., July 26 .- Investigation of the charges of cruelty against Supt. Brockway, of the State Reformatory, were continued today. John J. Delaney told of six or seven incarcerations in the solitary cells, each lasting three to five days, with his hands chained to the wall during the day and to the floor during the night.

Richard Quinn, a very reluctant witness. testified that he had been strung up and paddled by Brockway until he was insensible. He said he was bleeding from the nose and mouth and had wounds on the upper lip, also on the top of his head, from which scars remain.
