Great Activity Of the Enemy

Communications of British at Warrenton Threatened.

Boers in Force Between Fourteen Streams and Kimberley—
Gen. Hunter About to Start for Kimberley With 5,000
Men—Horse Sickness Prevails in Gen. Buller's Camp
—Two Members of Canadian Mounted Rifles Missing—Gen. Roberts' Supposed Plan.

London, Tuesday, May 1—3:50 a.m.—The Boers are showing uncommon activity west of Bloemfontein. They are in force between Fourteen Streams and Kimberley. On Sunday they occupied Windsorton, west of the railway, and now threaten to interrupt the communications of the British force at Warrenton to the north. This, too, at a time when Gen. Hunter is about to start on a 200 miles march to Mafeking, probably with 5,000 men.

To the east of Bloemfontein, the Boers on Sunday night were still holding the bills near Thabanchu, while behind them long wagon trains loaded with wheat for the Boer army in the north are moving through Ladybrand. The British captured one Boer convoy on Saturday, but its size is not mentioned.

Wepener.

Wepener is deserted, Gen. Brabant and Col. Dalgety having moved northward.

According to information from "Masearu," the main body of the Boers reached Leeuw River, due west of Ladybrand, on Sunday, small parties trailing behind at intervals of ten miles to protect the rear and whip up the herds. Slight outpost actions take place daily beyond Kamee Sliding.

GEN. ROBERTS' PLANS.

London, May 1.—The Central News publishes an interview with Major-General Sir William Henry Rhodes Green, the famous Anglo-Indian strategist and fighter whose predictions during the war have been singularly correct. His present belief is that Gen. Roberts, after leaving a strong force to oppose the main Boer army at Kroonstad, will strike for Van Heesman's Pass and overwhelm the Boers who are now in Natal, and with Gen. Buller's army invade the Transvaal by way of Laing's Nek. This statement has not attracted nearly the amount of attention it deserves. It certainly has the merit of novelty and probability. That there is some amount of truth in it is strengthened by the fact that Gen. Green is a close personal friend of Field Marshal Lord Wolseley and Adjutant-Gen. Sir Evelyn Wood.

Buller.

OFFERED TO RESIGN.
Adjutant-Gen. Wood stated yesterday that as soon as he learned of the publication of Gen. Lord Roberts' strictures on the conduct of the Lady-smith relief operations, Gen. Buller tendered his resignation to Gen. Roberts, who refused to accept it.

The morning papers give special prominence to the statement of a news agency that Sir Redvers Buller sent his resignation to Lord Roberts after the Spion Kop censures were published and that Lord Roberts declined to accept it.

African horse sickness has broken out in Gen. Buller's army. It proves especially fatal among freshly-arrived animals. The Bloemfontein correspondents point out that the deficiency in the veterinary department caused thousands of losses.

The country north of Sunday's River seems comparatively clear of Boers. Gen. Louis Botha has returned to Pretoria from Ladysmith to assume the supreme command of the Transvaal forces.

Gen. Lucas Meyer, replying to Gen. Buller's complaint that some of the British prisoners at Pretoria are lodged in the town jail, says that only those who are so treated who have tried, or who are suspected of trying, to escape. He retorts, moreover, that Boer prisoners are confined in the town jail at Pietermaritzburg with the natives.

Roberts.

A TARGET FOR CRITICISM.
London, May 1.—Yesterday's South African mail brought letters dated Bloemfontein, April 7, from which it would seem that Gen. Roberts himself was primarily responsible for the Koonrdspruit disaster. Col. Broadwood sent word to Gen. Roberts four days before his loss, saying that the enemy in great force was near him and his two small brigades of cavalry and mounted infantry. Gen. Roberts told him to return. Col. Broadwood in reply told him the Boers were on

LORD ROBERTS

Reports Persistent Attacks by the Boers

On Saturday and Sunday in the Vicinity of Thabanchu.

Gen. Brabant Rescues a Convoy—Gen. White at Windsor—Her Majesty Decorates Ladysmith's Defenders With the Victoria Star and Cross.

London, May 1—1:55 p.m.—The following dispatch has been sent by Lord Roberts to the war office:

"Bloemfontein, April 30.—The Boers made very persistent attacks round Thabanchu Saturday and Sunday. But the position which the 8th (Rundle's division) holds is very strong, and he had the assistance of Gordon's and Dickson's brigades, the cavalry, under French, and Smith-Dorrien's infantry brigade, and a body of mounted infantry under Ian Hamilton. Pole-Carew's division returned from Dewetsdorp yesterday."

Lord Roberts also reports additional casualties sustained during the fighting of April 27, around Thabanchu, consisting of Lieut. Geary and two enlisted men killed, and one officer and three men wounded.

Neither the commander-in-chief's nor the correspondents' dispatches throw any light on the plans being adopted to oust the Boers from the neighborhood of Thabanchu, and how long before a determined effort will be made to reassert British superiority. It is only a matter of surmise. In the meantime the Boers are remarkably aggressive, and especially in view of large forces opposing them.

A special dispatch from Thabanchu, dated yesterday, says they made a determined attempt to cut off a British convoy which got into broken ground between Thabanchu and Dewetsdorp, opening fire from the adjacent hills. In the nick of time Gen. Brabant, with a strong force of yeomanry, returning from Wepener, arrived on the scene and extricated the convoy.

The Cape special correspondent describes the dispositions of the forces at Thabanchu as follows: "Gen. Rundle is covering the advanced camp facing the Boers' position to the east, where they are strongly entrenched. Gen. Ian Hamilton and Gen. Smith-Dorrien occupy strong positions on the road to the north." Another dispatch says a column under Gen. Hamilton located the Boers to the northwest, and an artillery duel ensued without result.

All accounts tell of much artillery firing, with scarcely any casualties. It is hardly likely that such forces can much longer patiently face each other without more stirring occurrences.

Gen. Brabant's column is expected soon to join Gen. French. A number of Boers are reported to have been seen retreating north, but this is scarcely authoritative.

Stringent measures are being adopted to prevent the Boer guerrillas from securing supplies from other centers.

The little news from Thabanchu is absorbing all interest.

The Cape Parliament has been summoned for June 22.

At the conclusion of General Sir George White's visit to Windsor today, Queen Victoria decorated the defender of Ladysmith with the Cross and Star of the Royal Victorian Order. Her majesty and the soldier had a lengthy conference.

It is learned that the Queen was more angry than for years over the publication of the Spion Kop dispatches.

TWO CANADIANS MISSING.

London, May 1.—A dispatch to the war office from Mafeking, in British Basutoland, southeast of Wepener, reports that two Canadian members of the mounted rifles are missing. They are:

Sergt. R. H. Ryan, B Squadron, he was on the reserve of officers, and belonged to Kentville, N.S.

Pte. Thomas E. Linden, of B Squadron. He had been in B Squadron of the Royal Canadian Dragoons.

THE BOER ENVOYS.

A Washington dispatch says: It can be stated that the persons composing the Boer delegation, who are about to sail from Europe to the United States, will not be denied access to the second round in South Africa, because Lord Methuen was "a society peer and a court favorite."

Mr. Wyndham said that the war office had not communicated with Gen. Buller in connection with the Spion Kop dispatches, but that communications had passed between Lord Roberts and Gen. Buller in reference to the publication of the dispatches in question.

The government leader, Mr. A. J. Balfour, subsequently announced that with "a view to clearing up misconceptions which had gathered round the publication of the dispatches," he would place the salary of the secretary of state for war among the votes to be taken Friday, and thus enable a debate to be had on the subject.

BUGLE BLASTS.
