

London, Thursday, May 24.

We can feel sorry for the Boer delegates, who must be content with dinners, receptions and speeches. Instead of the real help they seek, but sorrow for them is tempered by the recollection of what is meant by one twenty thousand killed, wounded, sick or prisoners. We are sorry that they did not see seven months ago what they can see now, that strong as they were by arms that others had bought for them, they were not strong enough to engage in a life and death struggle with the British Empire. They meant to do all the harm they could to Britain. They meant and hoped to draw other nations into the fray. Of course they thought that their interests justified this; but it would have involved such wide-spread evil that we are glad that they are disappointed, while we admit that there is something in their position that appeals for sympathy. Instead of seeking to develop kind relations with those who were their natural neighbors, they have carried on a long anti-British campaign, and now they have reached the end of it, appealing in vain to the great American Republic.

This manifestation of unity has impressed the world. The nations of the earth see that Britons stand together in the hour of trial. The hackneyed saying "United we stand, divided we fall," gains new meaning and larger power. This is good so long as men at home and abroad realize that the motto of the empire is Defense, not Defiance. There is not need that Britain should attack other nations, but there is need that the empire should discharge its world-wide responsibilities with honor and dignity, and to do this we must be prepared to defend ourselves from attacks from any quarter.

St. Thomas, May 23.—A head-on collision, resulting in the demolishing of the engines and slight injuries, occurred at Port Robinson Monday afternoon. The freight train of the N. & W. train collided with a double-header G. T. R. freight. The Wabash express, No. 5, left Niagara Falls at 3:35, on time, and was being piloted by Engineer John McGregor, of St. Thomas, and Conductor Crawford. At Port Robinson the train crashed into the freight, which was being piloted by N. & W. Engineer on the Wabash. The express was running between 10 and 15 miles an hour when she struck, and the three engines were badly smashed. The freight engine was not so badly smashable. The passengers on the express were badly shaken up, and one of the women was injured. The engineer and fireman were not saving their lives. The freight engine was Nos. 211 and 825, with Drivers Little and McManis. The Wabash was out of Toronto. They all saw the express coming and got clear of the train before the crash. The cause of the accident was the negligence of the Wabash. A billiard was sent out from Niagara Falls.
