
SCIENTISTS WHO CAN CUT ICE WITH GLASS

Marvelous Experiments Performed in Public With Liquid Air.

Paris, Feb. 13 .-- At a conference of the Museum of Natural History Prof. d'Arsonval liquefied air with the greatest success. It was liquefied by enormous pressures

The temperature of the liquefied air was minus 180 degrees Centigrade. The liquid can be kept in double-sided, silver-covered bottles, from which it will not evaporate, as it did in former ex periments when kept in other kinds of receptacles.

It was shown that the liquefied air destroys the elasticity of India rubber, which becomes hard and as brittle as deed in order to perfect the title for another party.
