DEDICATION CEREMONY.

Opening of the New Home of the Knights Templar

Pleasant Affair in Which Visiting Fraters and Local Entertainers Participated.

Richard Coeur de Lion Preceptory, No. 4, Knights Templar, whose new and extremely beautiful rooms occupy the top floor of the Ontario Loan and Debutent building in the Market Lane, had a two-fold honor last night—they welcomed and entertained the supreme grand master of Canada, Sir Knight David L. Carley, of Windsor, and had performed, under his guidance, for the first time in the grand jurisdiction, the dedication ceremony of the order. The new home of the Knights Templar, which was devoted to the work of the order last night, comprises a suite of handsomely equipped rooms, constructed with a view to the convenience of the Knights, and containing every facility for the advancement of their work. The enterprise of the preceptory in so adequately providing a substitute for the quarters destroyed by the Masonic Temple fire was commented upon by the grand knight in a speech that he made after the dedication ceremony. He said that Richard Coeur de Lion was always looked upon as one of the brightest and best working preceptories in the jurisdiction and had been an honor to the order. There were many members who deserved a great deal of credit for the position occupied by the preceptory—M. E. Sir Knight Dewar, of the old guard, and Sir Knights Escott, Campbell and Stenberg, younger members, even though they were old in the order. In conducting the dedication ceremony, Sir Knight Carley had as his staff: E. Sir Knight A. A. Campbell, of London, as chaplain; V. E. Sir Knight E. G. Swift, of Walkerville, as preceptor; R. E. Sir Knight A. M. Stewart, of Windsor, as constable; R. E. Sir Knight J. Danbara, of London, as marshal; E. Sir Knight W. H. Escott, of London, as standard-bearer. Most Eminent Sir Knight J. S. Dewar, of London, chairman of the London committee on entertainment and rooms, was also present. The latter and his staff were first presented under an arch of steel to the presiding preceptor of Richard Coeur de Lion, E. Sir Knight W. H. Escott, and on behalf of the preceptory, M. E. Sir Knight Dewar surrendered the rooms to the grand master with the hope that they would merit his approbation and the approval of the fraters.

Short speeches were subsequently made by Eminent Sir Knight Stewart, of Windsor; Eminent Sir Knight Swift, of Walkerville; V. E. Sir Knight Campbell, and the evening's entertainment was continued by Miss Kurzenknebe, whose readings were much enjoyed. Miss Grant, Mrs. D. M. Robb, Mr. Crawford, Mr. Charles Wheeler and the Italian Harpers. Refreshments were served to the company, which included a hundred or more of the Knights Templar and their friends.

TUMBLING INTO A BOILER OF WATER

Daughter of Rev. C. C. Owen Sustains Serious Injury.

While playing about the Memorial Church rectory yesterday, Winnie Owen, 5-year-old daughter of Rev. C. C. and Mrs. Owen, accidentally fell into a cauldron of boiling water, and was most painfully and seriously injured. Physicians were called and found the child to be terribly scalded almost all over the body. The doctors hope that although so seriously injured, the child will recover, a hope which is joined in by everyone in the community.

TRIBUTE TO THE LATE H. A. HARPER

The Last Words Penned by the Heroic Newspaper Man.

Referring to the late Henry A. Harper, whose lamentable but heroic death in Ottawa recently is still fresh in the minds of London people, the Labor Gazette, the government journal with which he was associated, says:

"In an effort to save the life of another he gave his own life, and in so doing, died, as he had lived, inspired by an ideal of duty, of which self-sacrifice, true manliness and devotion to duty were the enduring realities. His last act but epitomized his life. . . . Knowing of the needs and aspirations of the workmen and working women of the nation, he was truly sincere in his efforts to raise their status and improve their condition, and he brought to this aim all that training, discipline and culture had brought into his life. His own words, among the last that he wrote, tell best of the spirit in which he hoped to achieve his aim, and what he conceived of the purpose of his work to be. It is fitting that these words should complete the only space he had left unfilled in the present number of the Gazette; they may be taken as his last from the editor's chair."

"Your strongest weapon is the commanding influence of a high-minded manhood, moved by noble impulses and unalloyed by selfish motive. Strength lies in the fact that what you seek is fairness, truth and justice, as well as the promotion of individual peace and the country's welfare."
