FREDERICK TEMPLE, PRIMATE OF ALL ENGLAND, IS DEAD

Passed Peacefully Away in Presence of Family.

CORONATION DAY FORETOLD END

His Failing Strength First Indicated by Pathetic Scene at Crowning of the King.

London, Dec. 23.—The Most Rev. Frederick Temple, Archbishop of Canterbury and Primate of All England, who has been ill for some time past, is dead.

The Archbishop of Canterbury passed away quite peacefully at 8:15 o'clock in the presence of his wife and two sons. His death was anticipated for some days, and only the archbishop's remarkable vitality enabled him to counteract his extreme weakness. The final collapse occurred about 6 o'clock, and he was unconscious towards the end. The primate died of old age. The pathetic scene in Westminster Abbey at the coronation of King Edward, was one of the earlier indications of his failing strength. Then

came the collapse in the House of Lords at the conclusion of a vigorous speech in support of the education bill. He had not left his bed since. He will be buried at St. Dunstons, London, on Monday.

The Most Rev. Frederick Temple, Archbishop of Canterbury and Primate of All England, was 81 years of age. Up to a short time ago he was in the enjoyment of perfect health, and carried out his ecclesiastical duties with vigor and zest. Born at Santa Maria, Ionian Islands, he was educated at Blundell's school, Tiverton, Devon, and at Oxford. He made his mark as headmaster of Rugby school, after some years' experience as master in a smaller institution, and Government inspector of training colleges. He became Bishop of Exeter in 1889, Bishop of London in 1895, and in 1898 was appointed Archbishop of Canterbury. For many years he was subjected to bitter criticism on account of an essay from his pen, which appeared during his career at Rugby in a volume containing also articles written by a number of divines. It was alleged that his own and a number of other articles were not orthodox, and his every advancement afterwards was a position made the subject for fierce attacks by his critics. MARCONI SHOWERED WITH CONGRATULATORY MESSAGES

Wizard of Wireless Telegraphy in Great Spirits.

Talks of Arranging for Commercial Work.

King Edward Sends Nice Reply to Inventor's First Message--Delays in His Work.

Sydney, N. S., Dec. 23.—Marconi's modest little office at Bleak Table Head was today flooded with congratulatory messages from all parts of the world, and the wireless wizard was in great spirits.

The first inkling that his experiments were crowned with success was obtained on Sunday morning, when one of Marconi's staff asked the Cape Breton Yacht Club at Sydney for the loan of a number of flags, as Mr. Marconi evidently intended to celebrate the success of his work by a display of bunting at Table Head. The fierce gale and rain which is sweeping around the coast today prevented him from carrying out this intention. There is nothing at Table Head to signalize his triumph.

Pretender to Throne of Morocco Wins Bloody Battle.

Tangier, Morocco, Dec. 23.—The imperial troops have been totally defeated after a sanguinary battle with the rebels, headed by the pretender to the throne. The latter decapitated 40 of the Sultan's soldiers. Their heads are now ornamenting his tent.

Imperial reinforcements have been sent to attempt the capture of Taza, the headquarters of the pretender. Incensed by the successes of the rebels, the Sultan has ordered his soldiers to spare no one. Taza, in spite of the advice of the chiefs who counseled him not to indulge in excesses.
