The revenue from the department of lands, forests and mines shows a noteworthy increase this year over that of 1906. It totaled last year \$3,068,494.09. as compared with \$2,253,199 in the previous twelve months. The detail of these receipts is as follows: From crown lands, agricultural and mining, \$1,254,303.63; mining leases and crown rent, \$25,279.47; mining leases and recording fees \$272,397.01; royalties which includes payments by the O'Brien Mine, \$207,945.06; supplementary revenue \$43,453.53, the amount produced by the mining tax imposed last woods and forests, \$1,219,including \$152,223.94 from bonuses and \$998,863.15 from timber


