# ALTITUDE RECORD **BROKEN BY HOXSEY**

WHOLESALE ORDERS

Daring Aviator Flew 11,474 Feet Business Is Said to Have Been Above the Earth.

IN A FORTY MILE GALE

That Little Air Craft Was in Great Danger-Grahame-White Gives Up the Channel Flight.




