

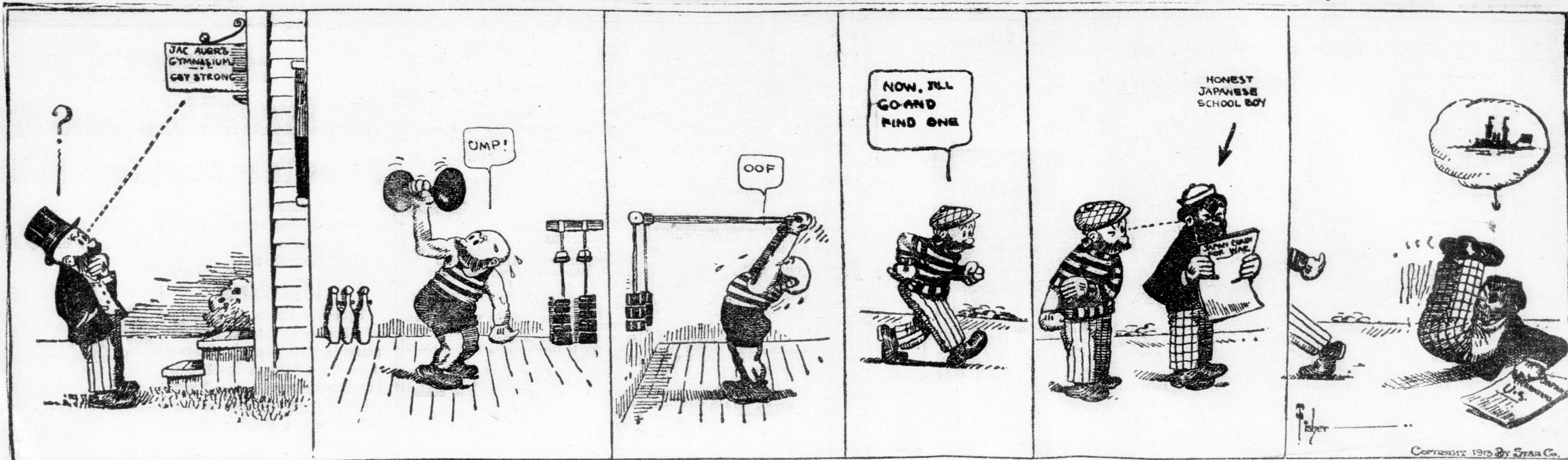

St. Thomas Grandstand Burned Down

St. Thomas, May 5.—Within two days of the opening of the season the St. Thomas Canadian League Baseball Club sustained a severe loss today, when the grandstands at Pinafora Park went up in flames. The game between the locals and the Cuban Giants was in progress when fire broke out underneath the stand. The blaze had gained much headway before it was noticed, but attempts to check it were futile.

The stands had just been enlarged and improved by the addition of shower baths, dressing-rooms, etc., and \$2,000 will be needed to replace them. The stands are owned by the city, who furnished the grounds to the ball team. It will now be necessary for the team to play for a time at the athletic grounds' park, recently given to the city by the St. Thomas Athletic Association. Today's game was not finished owing to the fire.

STATE LEGISLATORS
WILL ATTEND BOUTIn Order to Prove Argument in Favor
of Boxing in Illinois.

Chicago, May 6.—Members of the Legislature will be guests tonight at a boxing exhibition in Springfield, staged as an argument in favor of the boxing bill pending in both Houses. No admission will be charged.
A large number of state officials have said they will attend. Gov. Dunne accused himself, stating that while he had no objection to clean boxing, he does not think it proper for him as governor to be present at the matches tonight.
Senator Carroll, who introduced the bill, is promoting the demonstration, left today for the state capital with a dozen boxers and their trainers. Senator Carroll asserted that he believed "boxing will be legal in Illinois within a week."

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
