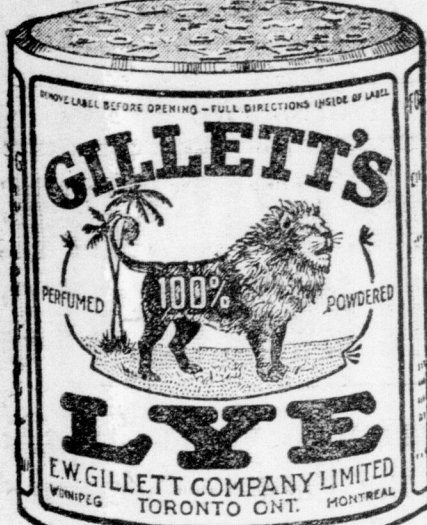

MR. J. McQUAKER WAS FORMALLY NOMINATED

A Lively Campaign Will Take Place in North Grey During the Next Two Weeks.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Owen Sound, July 7.—Mr. John McQuaker was formally nominated as Liberal candidate in the coming North Grey by-election here this afternoon. He was named by Mayor Lemon and Neil McDonald.

Colin Cameron, the Conservative candidate, was nominated also.

Mr. McQuaker at once started for a two days' canvass in the eastern sections of the riding in company with Mr. J. C. Elliott, M. P. He appeared tonight at White's school house in St. Vincent Township, where he was forceful and fluent on the duty of an Opposition. He outlined the work of the Liberal party in the Legislature, and showed the present day tendency towards centralization and bureaucracy.

The situation in Ontario today, he said, was that a few men had allocated to themselves the functions and authorities of government. The rights and privileges of the Legislature were being gradually usurped by the cabinet, and the province was in danger of an era of "order in council" rule.

An earnest temperance advocate himself, Mr. McQuaker made a special plea on behalf of the advanced cause taken by the Liberal party for the abolition of the bar in Ontario. It was not enough, he pointed out, to say that North Grey, now without bars, need not consider the effect of the temperance question in Ontario. The time had come when this important question had forced itself into the forefront of needed social reforms.

North Grey had reason to be proud of the record as a temperance constituency, and it now has the opportunity of declaring in favor of a policy that would make the benefits of further restricting the sale of intoxicating liquors province-wide.

Sylvia Pankhurst Wants a Real Riot

Arrested at Bromley Meeting for Not
Appearing When Summoned.

London, July 7.—Miss Sylvia Pankhurst, the second daughter of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, who was summoned to appear in court because of her connections with the recent attempted raid on the houses of the ministers in Downing street and who failed to appear, was arrested at Bromley today during a suffragette meeting.

The young woman appeared on the platform in the middle of the meeting. Her hair was untidy and her hat was awry. She had a straw travelling bag in her hand. As soon as she mounted the platform Sylvia began talking fast and wild. She said among other things: "We are out for riots, I have had no hand in a real riot yet, but I mean to have it."

Several speakers at the weekly meeting of the Women's Social and Political Union today denounced as a "desperate lie" the story printed by the Daily Mail yesterday to the effect that the suffragette organization had been practically wiped out of existence through the operations of the "cat and mouse" law, and that no contributions were being received to the funds of the militants.

Forestry Convention Opens at Winnipeg

Winnipeg, July 7.—The formal opening of the Canadian Forestry Convention takes place tonight at 8 o'clock, when Lieut.-Governor D. C. Cameron officiates. An address of welcome will be delivered by a representative of the Provincial Government. Mayor Deacon, the president of the board of trade, and the president of the industrial bureau, will also deliver speeches. Responses will be made by the president of the convention, and by the different governments present.

MAY BE BURNED

Young Scotchman, Watchman On the
Burned Boat, is Missing.

Toronto, July 7.—Alex. Munro, a young Scotchman of 25, who was watchman of the boat Pontiac, which was burned at the dock here last night, has been missing since the fire, and much anxiety is felt. Munro had sleeping quarters in the wheelhouse, and it was in that section of the boat where the fire apparently started.

STRIKE STILL ON; MINERS REFUSING TO START WORK

Serious Trouble Threatened As
Result of Agitators' Plans.

Fear Dynamite Outrages and
Attempts to Damage Street
Railway.

Johannesburg, July 7.—Many of the gold miners refuse to return to work. At a meeting held in Union Park this afternoon militant leaders delivered fiery speeches to the 3,000 assembled, and a resolution declaring that the strike was still on and condemning the strikebreakers was carried.

One of the chief speakers announced the organization of a new union of the South African workers, which, he said, would be a revolutionary party. Efforts are now being made at Bloemfontein to bring out the railway workers.

Dispute Over Terms.

A dispute is on over the actual terms of settlement which Gen. Botha, the ex-premier, and Gen. Smuts, minister of mines, made with the unions. The unionists assert they insisted that the Government provide for the miners whose place were taken by strikebreakers until new places should be found for them; that Gen. Botha and Smuts agreed to this but thought it inadvisable to put it into writing, and also that the leaders claimed amnesty for the rioters. Gen. Botha, replying to that, said that they had attempted to show that they could not do a better bargain than they did in order to strengthen themselves with the men.

Attempts to dynamite the Rand Club and other buildings are feared. The club is barricaded and deserted, except for armed members who patrol the premises day and night. The residences of the mine owners are guarded by soldiers.

An attempt to destroy the railroad between Johannesburg and Germiston was made during the night, but failed. The only newspaper published today—a four-page sheet issued by the printers' union.

"Murdered by Capitalists." Twelve thousand members of the trades unions marched today at the funeral of the victims of the riots. Immense crowds lined the route. The Right Rev. Michael Bolton, Bishop of Pretoria, officiated. He begged the multitude to return to their homes peacefully out of respect for the dead. The spokesman of the Trades Federation made a similar appeal. "Disperse quietly," he said, "or we are a disorganized rabble." Among the wreaths was one from the Socialist party inscribed: "In memory of our martyrs, foully murdered in cold blood by the capitalist class."

At the end of the ceremony the Socialists assembled outside the cemetery and sang, "The Red Flag."

DIED ON VISIT

William Brown, Pioneer of Egremont
Stricken at Durham.

Durham, July 8.—Mr. Wm. Brown, an Egremont pioneer, about 75 years of age, was buried yesterday at Maplewood Cemetery, 5 miles south of here. Mr. Brown was taken ill about three months ago, while stopping with his daughter at Holstein, but was apparently recovering.

He came up to Durham on the 2 o'clock Friday afternoon train to visit his daughter, Mrs. Melville Storey, and shortly after, taking a weak spell, went to bed. Death came at 9 o'clock. His wife died seven or eight years ago. Mr. Brown leaves a grown-up family, most of whom are in the West.

HAVANA POLICE CHIEF SHOT DOWN IN STREET

His Action in Closing Gambling
House Aroused Ire of Governor
and Friends.

Havana, July 7.—General Armando Riva, chief of police of Havana, was shot and probably mortally wounded by Governor Asbert, of Havana Province, and others who had been angered by the recent action of the chief in closing up a political and gambling club.

The chief of police was driving on the Prado with two small children, when he met an automobile in which were seated Governor Asbert, Representative Arias and Senator Vidal Morales. The automobile was turned so as to block the progress of the chief's coach. The occupants of the automobile hurled insults at the chief and then drew revolvers and began firing. Twenty shots or more were fired. The chief attempted to use his body as a shield for his children, and received a bullet in the stomach, which perforated the intestines in four places. Another bullet struck the chief in the face. After the shooting Chief Riva made a declaration, in which he said that Governor Asbert and Senator Vidal Morales had shot him.

After the shooting, the men who fired the shots jumped from the car and fled. Senator Morales and Representative Arias were arrested shortly afterwards, and there is a report that Governor Asbert has been apprehended at Marianao, a suburb of Havana.

There were many witnesses to the affair, all of whom say it was a cold-blooded, unprovoked attempt at murder. The coachman who was driving Chief Riva's coach was shot in both legs.

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Badly Scalded by Bursting of Valve

Durham Engineer Was Knocked Down
While Working in Mill.

Durham, July 8.—When turning on the steam to the engine at the Durham Furniture Company's sawmill shortly after 7 o'clock Saturday morning, John Baid, the engineer, was severely scalded about the chest and arms. The boiler carried a 90-pound steam pressure at the time of the accident, and the engine was fed with a 4-inch pipe. When the steam was turned on from the boiler, the steam-valve at the engine split in two and flew several feet. The escaping steam struck Mr. Baid in the chest, and knocked him down. A heavy rain saved him from a more serious scalding. He was taken to a near-by house and medical aid summoned. He is progressing favorably.

Claim Undertakers Stole From House

Montreal, July 7.—Daniel Seguin and Albert Pageau, two undertakers, were brought before Judge Lafontaine, charged with stealing clothing and a watch from Corea Savert, 233 Dufresne street. The two prisoners pleaded not guilty and were remanded until Wednesday.

It is alleged that the accused went to the house of Corea Savert to prepare his late brother's body for burial, but before they left the house had taken a coat and watch. Pageau stated that he had taken the coat by mistake, while Seguin declared that it was not his he had put it in a fire and burned it. The watch, which was in the coat, was recovered by detectives.
