Herrmann Will Not Talk About Peace Conference

CINCINNATI, Nov. 2. — Chairman August Herrmann, of the National Baseball Commission, returned today from Chicago, where he had a conference with Federal League magnates on the subject of peace between organized baseball and that league. Mr. Herrmann would not say anything about the conference beyond a statement that the club owners of the National and American League will be consulted before any steps are taken in the negotiations. "None of those who have been talking for publication at this time," said Mr. Herrmann. "There may be something to give out before the meeting of the minor leagues, or directly thereafter, but any statement now would be mere guesswork."

WESTERN WILL TAKE STRONGEST TEAM TO PETROLEA SATURDAY

All the Regulars but Ross and Chatto Will Be on the Line-Up — Stanfield's Place Will Likely Be Filled by Ritchie—McIntyre and Sage To Turn Out.

Western University's victory over Sarnia Saturday was a costly one, for three of the best players on the team are at present laid up with little chance of getting back in the game for a couple of weeks. Tom Chatto is quite lame with a wrenched knee; Roy Wright has a sprained ankle and Johnny Ross strained his side again, the injury being severe enough to keep him out of a uniform for several days. All three are getting the best of treatment, however, and with a rest of a week or ten days should be fully recovered.

However, Coach Stephens will send the strongest team available to Petrolea on Saturday for the University's final district game. This game will have no bearing on the district championship but the locals will make every effort to win it as to give them a clean sweep.

"I thought at first it would be best to send a package up team to Petrolea, with only a couple of regular players," said "Cap" Stephens last night, "but I am afraid this would look a little 'yellow' and Petrolea would always say we were afraid to play them. The boys need the practice and this game will help wonderfully in putting them in line for the O.R.F.U. semi-finals. The whole team with the exception of Ross and Chatto will make the trip. These two players will have hardly recovered by that time and they would be unable to play. I expect Roy Wright to be in good shape for the game. Of course, there is the risk of getting one or two of the players injured but I think it is a slight one." This is the opinion of all the players. They want to go to Petrolea with the strongest team can produce and give the Hard Oils a real game. It would hardly be fair to Petrolea fans to ask them to pay good money to see a team of scratch players in the oil town aggregation. They have had little chance seeing London in action this season and their only opportunity is on Saturday.

In the meantime, Coaches Stephens and Bell are hard at work tuning up all the regulars who are able to turn out to practice. A good workout was indulged in late yesterday afternoon and another will be held this afternoon at which all the players are urgently requested to be present. Stanfield has left for Toronto and it is not likely he will play again this season with Western although an effort will be made to try and get him for the games in the semi-finals. "Ritchie" Ritchie will take his place, in all probability, at the line and Ireland may be sent back to the back division and Pierce put in Ireland's place.

McIntyre, the former Assumption College star, who is attending St. Peter's seminary here, will be asked to turn out with the team. McIntyre is particularly handy and he has had a great deal of rugby experience, although used to the American style of game. He has expressed a willingness to turn out with the club but so far has not shown up at any of the practices.

"Tiny" Sage, whose name has been connected with rugby in this city for these many years, has also signified his intention of turning out with the club. "Tiny" experience will come in handy and he will be of great assistance in coaching the boys. He is eager to get into the game again and it will not be surprising to see him in the line-up at Petrolea Saturday.

So far this season, the Western University line has not been crossed for a touchdown. The highest number of points that have been scored on the team at any one time is 2, Sarnia scoring two safety touches and a dead-line touch. All the other points were scored by dead-line kicks or ruggies. The students have scored 22 points to their opponents' 20.

Now that the district title has come this way, the question in the minds of local fans who have been following the team in the next round of the Junior O.R.F.U. series. So far, there are two teams who are the likely victims. Galt is the nearest one and Toronto Capitals the other one. The Capitals have not won their district yet but they expect to do so next Saturday when they meet Parkdale. If Parkdale wins this game, the district goes to them, but as the Capitals have already beaten Parkdale once this season, the chances are last year's junior champions will win out. Sarnia had to play off with the Capitals last year after the local district was decided but that was mainly because the local district was late in ending last season.

It is not unlikely that sudden death games will be ordered for the next round and this will mean that the teams will have to play on neutral grounds. If Western has to play Galt, the game will likely be played in Stratford, or if the Capitals are ordered to play Western, the game will in all probability be played in Brantford or Hamilton.

PUNTS AND PASSES

The majority of the Western University team was out to practice yesterday afternoon. The boys were put through a light workout by Coaches Stephens and Bell. "Cap" took charge of the line, while Jimmie drilled the back division. "Cap" pointed the ball to the backs, and sent the line down full force on the punts, who ran the ball back, and did some line passing.

Jimmie Bell is beginning to know all the boys by their first names. "That's right, Art, old boy, pass 'em out to 'Irish,' just before Eddie tackles you," he said once.

Ireland promises to be just as good a half-back as Stanfield, who has left for Toronto. "Irish" did some excellent running at the practice. He is a hard man to tackle, and makes an excellent side-partner for Art Smith.

Ritchie did some nice booting on the run and will undoubtedly make good on the back division.

"Mushy" Ross will not play in the game against Petrolea next Saturday. He was badly strained in the game in the "Turned Town" over a week ago, was not in shape, and was quite sore. However, "Mushy" the game, only to strain it worse than ever. "Doc" McConnell, who has "Mushy" in charge, has put him down, and insists that Jimmie should rest up for two weeks at least.

"Rosy" Roy Wright and Tommy Chatto were also visitors to "Doc" yesterday afternoon. Tommy has a badly strained knee, while Roy has an ankle that looks like a puffball. Both boys will have to rest up for a few weeks.

CANADA IS GOING TO TEACH UNITED STATES THE RIGHT WAY TO PLAY FOOTBALL

Judging from the developments in football thus far this fall, America is evolving another great national game—a game worthy the name of football.

The evolution of the great college game affords an interesting story, and the lovers of the old, bruising, battering style of game, the mass formations, the heavy line bucking, will be shocked and the cry of heavy will arise when they learn what immense strides in departures from the old game have been made.

Twenty-five years ago a few of our American colleges played a game called football. There was some science, some kicking and some long passing of the ball. It was, however, a mass game, a little battle of force rather than skill. It was art of war applied to eleven men on a side.

Instead of opening out and playing more freely, the game became one of closer and closer formations, heavier and heavier assaults, as little kicking as possible, practically no passing of the ball. It was a strong man's game. As the game spread, the roughness and often the brutality of it aroused protests.

Those who made the rules for football heard the storm of protest and commenced striving to lessen the roughness. In so doing they remade the game. The western schools three years ago, two years ago and last year opened up and commenced playing a faster, more spectacular and more risky game. The east refused to abandon the old straight football and persisted in heavy battering of the line and occasional end runs. Suddenly it dawned upon the coaches of the great eastern schools that they were far behind the west in the matter of offensive play, although still superior on defensive. This year they not only saw the west at its own game but they also saw the west style of attack. The big eastern game that would dazzle the west and stun the Heffelfingers and make them wonder if they ever saw a game like that.

It seems now that we have called upon Canada to coach us. The makers of the game in the two countries will not be slow to follow.
